Forest Fires Reduced to a Minimum

Forest Supervisor Ross is greatly pleased over the results of the co-operative efforts of different associations acting with the forest service to keep down fires. While the original outlay this year has been much greater than usual for fire protection, it has resulted in practically stamping out fires. There has been several incipient blazes, but

they were put out before they got headway.

Another thing that has helped to keep the fires down is the watchfulness of campers. The campaign of education to guard against loss by fire devastation has taught the people the dangers of leaving campfires unextinguished. By using intelligent care and co-operating with the forest service millions of dollars will be saved to the people, where otherwise it would go up in smoke.

Work Commenced on New Steel Bridge

Engineer E. D. Acey with a crew of men commenced work Monday on the new steel bridge over Crooked river west of town. The Const Bridge Company has the contract. The bridge will be 125 feet long, with an 18-foot roadway in the clear. It will have two sets of steel tubular piers 25 feet long by three feet in diameter. The steel for the bridge is now at Redmond. It will take six weeks, Mr. Acey says, to complete the work. The steel f. o. b. Redmond cost the county \$4,515. The work of construction will be given to the county at actual cost by the bridge company.

The new bridge will rest just north of the old one, which will be taken down and moved to some point between Prineville and O'Neil.

Black Pine Poles for the Asking

Forest Supervisor Ross says that the forest service would be glad to give, free of charge, the black pine poles on the top of the divide between Trout and Mill creeks. These poles are useful for fencing and construction work. There is no road on the Mill creek side, he says, but the forest service expects to build one, just when he could not state. There is a road on the Ashwood side from Trout creek to Ashwood.
