Struck Water on the Desert

Peter Erickson, who lives on the desert 14 miles south of Prineville, on the new Bear creek road, has struck water on the Williams' Flat. Mr. Erickson has been persistent in the face of great discouragement, but when he had to haul water from Powell Butte it was worth while to take a long chance, and he won. Water was struck at 500 feet. It was solid rock all the way. The well drillers tried to pump it dry, but could not. The normal height of the water is 40 feet.

The mere fact that water can be found on the flat will be a great thing for that section, where it had to be hauled from Powell Butte. A pump and gasoline engine will be put in at once.

Andrew Noble Has a Fine Place

Andrew Noble has a fine place two miles north of town. He started in last year with 80 acres, but kept buying until now he has 300 acres. He has been clearing and plowing until it is about all under cultivation. Most of it is under ditch.

Mr. Noble set out 500 raspberry, gooseberry and currant bushes this year. Next year he will supply the local market with small fruit. He will have 40 acres of fruit trees, besides those he got with the Collins place. He cut 170 tons of hay and harvested 2000 bushels of grain—barley and wheat. He thinks that a pretty good start. He didn't have much hired help, either, he says, except through harvest.

The orchard at the house has trees loaded with Yellow Transparent, pears, cherries, peach plums, prunes, etc. The trees have to be propped down under their weight of fruit. Next season Mr. Noble will handle chickens on a large scale. He's fixed for it. His Buff Orpington ducks and other fancy fowl should cop the prizes at the fair this fall.
