Prof. J. B. Shouse of the Bend High School discussed very ably the standardization of the teaching profession by means of tests, frequently self-applied.

Mrs. Coe in a short half-hour talk touched upon the rudimentary part of school music and how to present it to children.

Monday evening a most delightful reception was tendered the teachers by the Ladies' Annex at the Commercial Club hall, which had been transformed by means of decorations of autumn leaves. The entertainment was unique. Guests upon arrival were required to register as for college and to pass through laughable tortures in the form of examinations in three departments, music, art, and physical culture. A high degree of proficiency being attained in each they again passed to the club hall and were entertained by a program of speaking and music.

Upon assembling Tuesday morning the teachers were pleased to find that Prof. E. D. Ressler of O. A. C. had arrived. He discussed the pleasure one finds in work, under the following topics:

1. Rational happiness in life is conditional on economic independence.
2. Rational happiness includes joy in work as well as in leisure.
3. The sources of joy in work.
4. Education must reveal to the pupil his special abilities and the need of his life.

Some of the helpful thoughts given in his afternoon lecture are as follows: "In rural schools a teacher may become a specialist in organiza-

tion, in administration, or in finding a way for directing the self-activity of pupils. The teacher has a great opportunity to interest boys and girls in grange, literary societies or agricultural improvements.

For the man who has missed his chance in early life Prof. Ressler recommends fifteen minutes a day with President Eliot's five-foot book shelf; this will give a man a liberal education. Free correspondence courses in our state institutions are also within the reach of all. It is possible to grow in scholarship, in professional zeal and usefulness. A true teacher takes the same pride that a parent does in the achievements of the boys and girls."

Mrs. Fulkerson opened her talk on "A Boy's Eye View" by claiming the distinction of having "eaten her dinner in the basement with the boys" for a period of time sufficiently long to know what "us boys" think. Her unusual point of view was the most helpful in setting before the teachers some of the real problems of school life.

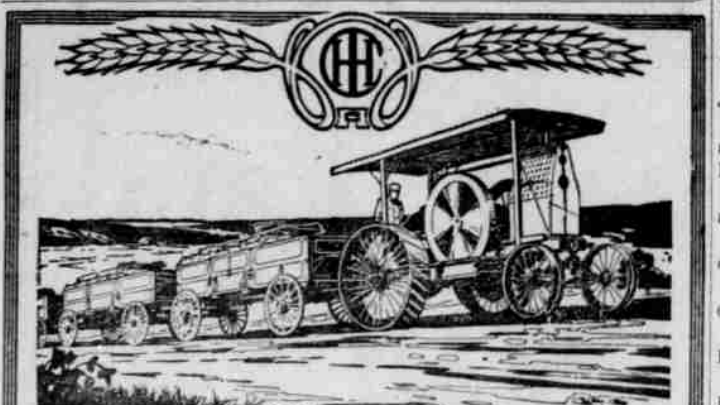

In his lecture upon "Education for Efficiency" he said: "Schools are inefficient because we are doing so many things wrong. We do not discriminate between what is worth while and what is useless." Counties in other states may be doing more than counties in this state but there is no state that is doing as much for educational progress as Oregon under the leadership of Supt. Alderman.
