## Crook County Election Returns

The official count of the election returns does not change the names of the winning candidates announced last week, but it does change the majorities announced, yet not enough to affect the general results.

Wilson carried the county by a plurality of 294. His vote was 1053. Taft 759, Roosevelt 612; Debs, socialist, 287; Chafin, prohibitionist, 62. These totals are the averages of the votes cast for the presidential electors. We did not carry out the fractions as they would in no wise change the results.

The vote on woman suffrage in Crook county was 1062 for and 973 against.

Attorney Forbes of Bend and A. O. Smith of Klamath county were elected representatives from the 21st district, which includes Crook, Grant, Klamath and Lake counties.

The Oregon legislature, which meets this winter, will have a majority on joint ballot of 82 out of 90 members. There will be 28 republicans and two democrats in the senate, and 54 republicans and 6 democrats in the house.

W. Lair Thomson of Lake county was reelected to the senate from the 17th district—Crook, Klamath and Lake counties.

A. H. Kennedy was elected justice of the peace in this precinct. He got 210 votes out of 277 cast.

Harry Hudson was elected constable.

### Some Strong Recommendations

By an oversight the following resolutions passed by the Crook County Teachers' Institute have not been published. The resolutions, in part, are as follows:

That we most strongly recommend in the appointment of members upon the State Text Book Commission that persons of training and actual teaching experience only be appointed.

That we recommend the inclusion of industrial, agricultural and musical work in the school course, that we urge its fullest development and pledge to it our earnest co-operation.

That we heartily endorse any movement that has for its object the establishment of permanent demonstration farms, both dry and irrigated land, and that the honorable county court be respectfully requested to provide necessary funds for said demonstration farms.

That we most strongly urge the inclusion of books on sezoiology in the library lists, the choice of text book, and the adequate teaching of the subject in our schools.

That we urge the need of a thorough and competent medical examination of the school children and the elimination of physical defects which retard and hinder their development and advancement.

That boarding homes in the charge of competent superintendents be established and maintained by public school authorities in scholastic centers for the benefit of children who are now deprived of school privileges through distance from schools.

That especial attention be given to the question of closer intercourse between the schools and homes by all school officials and teachers.

That we hereby express our appreciation of the great value and importance of the work committed to the care of our district school boards, of the dignity and honorableness of their positions, and that we urge that the chairman of such

boards be elected by the boards.

That we respectfully request because of the limited means of transportation and the time and expense required to reach the place of convening, that we be given credit for a full week's teaching when in attendance upon the county institute.

Be it further resolved, that since the schools of Crook county have during the past four years enjoyed unprecedented success and prosperity and are accomplishing more and better work than ever before, and that since strong and especially trained teachers are being constantly injected into the teaching force of our county through the tireless efforts of our superintendent, and that all administrations of the superintendent have been with uniform kindness and justice.

Be it resolved, that we express our love and sincere appreciation to Superintendent R. A. Ford for the most excellent work he has accomplished as head of the schools of Crook county.
