Dear Sir: I am today in receipt of your letter of the 10th instant in which you ask for an opinion concerning the disposition of various fees and mileages earned by the sheriff of your county. You wish to know whether or not he should turn the same over to the county treasurer, or could he keep them in addition

to his regular salary. Replying I would state that it is provided in Chapter 199 of the General

Laws of Oregon for 1911, that: "The said officers shall receive no other compensation whatever for their services, and all fees collected under existing laws, by them, shall be turned into the county treasury of said county."

I am of the opinion that this restriction applies to all of the county officers. and that all fees collected by any of 2 50 the county officers should be turned in-\$12 00 to the county treasury.
