It has recently been brought to the attention of the county judge that a number of merchants are violating the state law which prohibits the sale of tobacco to minors, and also that boys are using tobacco in public places. He feels that in many cases these offenses are being committed in ignorance of the law, and is The groom is a well known young anxious to do all he can in the way of warning before any action is taken. To this end the following letter has been sent to a number of parents:

> "Dear Sir-It has been reported to the juvenile court of this county that a number of boys under the age of eighteen are violating a state law regulating the use of tobacco in any form by a minor in public, (Sec. among this number, so in order to save yourself and him future trouble, we would advise that you take steps to correct this you can ascertain from what source your boy obtains his to bacco, we shall be glad to cooperate with you in enforcing the law against those who are know ingly contributing to the de linquency of a minor by furnishing him tobacco without the consent of his parent or guardian.
