

## Pendleton Presbytery Held at Prineville

The Presbytery of Pendleton held a 4-days' session in Prineville, commencing Thursday evening of last week. Rev. I. I. Gorby of Bend preached the opening sermon. Friday two devotional meetings and two business sessions were held with a sermon in the evening by Rev. J. E. Faucett. On Saturday two devotional meetings and two business sessions were held, with a Sunday School meeting in the evening at which addresses were made by Rev. J. F. Vernon and Rev. J. V. Milligan.

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## Judge Springer Warns Parents

It has recently been brought to the attention of the county judge that a number of merchants are violating the state law which prohibits the sale of tobacco to minors, and also that boys are using tobacco in public places. He feels that in many cases these offenses are being committed in ignorance of the law, and is anxious to do all he can in the way of warning before any action is taken. To this end the following letter has been sent to a number of parents:

"Dear Sir—It has been reported to the juvenile court of this county that a number of boys under the age of eighteen are violating a state law regulating the use of tobacco in any form by a minor in public. (See 2149 L. O. L.) Your boy is among this number, so in order to save yourself and him future trouble, we would advise that you take steps to correct this evil tendency on his part. If you can ascertain from what source your boy obtains his tobacco, we shall be glad to cooperate with you in enforcing the law against those who are knowingly contributing to the delinquency of a minor by furnishing him tobacco without the consent of his parent or guardian. (See 2148-2150 L. O. L.) Trusting this note of warning will be sufficient to put you on the alert, we remain,

With each of these letters was enclosed the following sections from the code:

"Sec. 2148—Unlawful to furnish minor tobacco without parent's or guardian's consent. "It shall be unlawful to sell, barter, trade, give or in any manner, furnish to any minor under the age of eighteen years, any tobacco, cigars, or cigarette in any form, nor any compound of which tobacco is a component part, without the written consent of such minor's parent or guardian. Any person violating the provisions of this act shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than \$5 nor more than \$50."

"Sec. 2149—Unlawful for minor to smoke in public. It shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of eighteen years to smoke or in any way use any cigar, cigarette, or tobacco in any form whatsoever, in any public highway, street, place, square, or resort. Any minor violating the provisions of this act shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$10.00 or by imprisonment at the option of the court, two days for each offense.
