Metolius Must Cut Out the Liquor

Salem, Or., May 6.—Under the guise of law, the town of Metolius in Crook county, held a local option election in February, voted wet, and is now permitting the sale of liquor. Governor West today notified the deputy district attorney and sheriff of Crook county and the mayor of Metolius that the liquor was being sold illegally and he expected them to enforce the laws.

Metolius is in a dry precinct. Last December the town voted to incorporate. Shortly after the county court granted a petition for a home rule election in the newly incorporated town. The election was held in February and the town voted wet.

Prior to the election Attorney-General Crawford rendered an opinion in which he held that an election could not be held under the home rule amendment except in November, and even though the
