Prospective Bridegrooms Take Heed

On and after June 10 prospec medical examination by a licensed physician before a marriage license can be granted

County Clerk Brown says that much delay and confusion will be saved the applicant if the physician's certificate is secured before hand. Under the terms of the law the maximum charge allowed a physician for making the examination and issuing the certificate will be \$2.50. Destitute men may secure the examination by application to the county physician if they are in digents.

Following are the provisions of the new law:

"Before any county clerk in this state shall issue a marriage license, the applicant therefore bring in more that 1000 farmers shall file with the clerk from whom such license is sought, a mer. certificate from a physician duly authorized to practice medicine within the state, made under oath, within ten days from the date of filing the same, showing that the male person thus seeking to enter the marriage relation is free from contagious or infectious venerial disease.

"Any physician who shall. knowingly and wilfully, make a false statement in any certificate issued, as herein provided, shall official paper. \$1.50 a year.

"All fees and charges of any physician asking the necessary examination of and issuing the necessary certificate to any one party, as herein provided, shall not exceed the sum of \$2.50.

"The county physicians of the several counties shall, upon request, make the necessary examination and issue certificate, if the same can properly be issued, without charge to the applicant, if indigent."
