Stewed Chestnuts .- Peel off the out side skin of the chestnuts, then steep in bolling water until the inner skins can be removed. Throw the nuts as fast as peeled into cold water. Put two ounces of butter in a saucepan with two tablespoonfuls of flour. Stir until blended, then pour in a half pint or more of clear broth, stirring until smooth Sait to taste, add chestnuts and simmer gently until soft.

Serve with roasted meats or poultry. Deviled Chestnuts.-Take a quart of chestnuts, remove the shells and blanch the meats. Dry thoroughly, then place on the

fire in a saucepan and brown in hot olive oil or butter. Sprinkle with fine salt and a dash of cayenne and serve at dinher after the cheese



and serve A Toothsome Sweet. Chestnut Fritters.-Take a couple of dozen chestnuts. Roast and skin these and pound to a smooth paste. Add two tablespoonfuls of rice flour, one tablespoonful of sugar and two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice. Whisk the yolks of three eggs until light and whip the whites to a stiff froth with a pinch of salt. Stir first the yolks, then the whites, into the chestnut flour and use a little thick cream to moisten. Lift the mixture between two spoons, which have been well heated in boiling water, and fry in smoking hot fat.





Woman Mosaic Worker,

Miss Gertrude Martin is the only woman master mosaic worker in Eng land, and two new mosaics, her work, were unveiled in the lady chapel of the Westminster Roman Catholic cathedral at Easter. The method she uses is the same that was employed by the ancient Italian masters who worked in St. Mark's. Miss Martin is by profession an artist, having studied in England and in Paris, and two years ago took up the work of mosaic. She says it is work entirely suited to a woman if she does not mind getting her hands dirty. Any novice can work at a background, she says, but some training as an artist is necessary for the other work.

Dust a board with powdered sugar, spread the paste thinly on this and cut into any shape or size desired.

Seasonable Sweets.

Christmus Kisses .- Beat the whites of six eggs until stiff. Stir in one-half of powdered or confectioner's pound sugar. Drop this in teaspoonfuls on DIE, Trreas. oiled paper and dry in a slightly warm oven for about forty minutes. Lift from the paper and stick together in pairs with a bit of white of egg. Some of the kisses may be made by adding a little melted chocolate to the beaten egg and others by using a little melted red jelly to give them a pretty rose tint.

Ice Cream Candy .- Take eight cup fuls of sugar, two cupfuls of hot water, one teaspoonful of cream of tartar, dissolved in cold water, a lump of butter flie size of an egg and two teaspoonfuls of vanilla. Put the water and sugar on the fire in a saucepan. Stir until dis-solved. When it begins to boll add the cream of tartar and let it boll twenty minutes without stirring. Add the but-ter at the last minute. When it hardens in cold water it is done. Pour on buttered platters, sprinkle with vanilla and let it cool. Pull, drawing it out into sticks and cut with sharp seissors the desired length.


