### Trout and Pheasants for This Country

The state fish and game warden is sending out trout and pheasants from the hatcheries and game farms. About 1500 birds have already been hatched at the game farm and nearly 5000 eggs are now hatching. Most of the game birds are destined to stock the ranges of Eastern and Central Oregon.

### The Orange Tree.
