

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST.

Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

West Will Not Seek Office.
Salem.—Despite rumors to the effect that he would be a candidate for selection and that preliminary arrangements for his campaign were being made, Governor West positively announced here that he would not be candidate for the office again.
"I want it distinctly understood," declared the governor, "that anybody who says I will be a candidate for reelection does not know what he is talking about. I think when my term expires I will have accomplished all that I started out to accomplish and that will satisfy me. There is much hard work connected with the office, and the remuneration is not such that a man can save any money."

Opinion of Liquor Shipments Given.
Salem.—An opinion rendered by Attorney General Crawford holds that transportation companies cannot accept intoxicating liquor for shipment to dry territory unless they have in each territory an agent to keep a record of the shipments as provided in the bill passed at the last session of the legislature. It also is held that intoxicating liquor shipped into dry territory must be labeled as such, and a record must be kept by the transportation companies at the office where received and the office from which it is delivered.

Will Ask President to Aid Project.
Portland.—Secretary of the Interior Lane and the Oregon conservation commission are working in unison for a complete department of irrigation and water power projects of the state. Secretary Lane announces that, in cooperation with the Oregon commission, he would ask President Wilson to set aside approximately \$450,000 for reclamation service use in developing the lands of the Deschutes valley, if engineers' reports are favorable.

TO RECLAIM TULE LANDS

Owners Anxious to Close Channel Between Lake and River.
Klamath Falls.—Owners of tule land bordering on the lower Klamath lake have begun negotiations with the reclamation service to close the channel connecting the lake with Klamath river. If this is done the lands will soon be reclaimed by evaporation. When the railroad was built across the marsh, concrete headgates to control the flow of water across the channel were partially installed through the efforts of Abel Ady, who owned most of the land across which the railway company had to get a right-of-way. The closing of the gates has been prevented by the Van Brimmer ditch company, a private irrigation concern, which gets water from the lower Klamath lake. It is now proposed by the swamp land owners to supply water for the Van Brimmer ditch from the main canal of the Klamath project.

The channel could then be closed and close to 30,000 acres of marsh land made available for grazing and farming. The plan meets with the approval of the local officials of the reclamation service.

County Deputies Look After Weights

Salem.—Attention is being called by Deputy State Sealer of Weights and Measures F. G. Buchtel to the fact that under the bill creating his office, it is mandatory upon the county courts to appoint deputies in the counties of the state. These deputies will be under the supervision of the deputy state sealer of weights and measures. Mr. Buchtel has been provided with a room at the statehouse and has entered actively upon his duties.

Night Fishing is Target

Astoria.—With the avowed object of putting a stop to night fishing for trout in the various streams in the county, an organization of 200 sportsmen of this city and vicinity has been formed and each member has been appointed a deputy game warden to serve without pay but with authority to arrest offenders. Some of the best trout streams in this district have been practically ruined by the night fishers, who build large bonfires adjacent to some of the deep pools and as the fish attracted by the light rush in, they are slaughtered by the wholesale.

Mineral Resources to Be Detailed.

Ashland.—In accordance with an appointment from the state commission of mines, Dr. Winchell, of the faculty of the University of Wisconsin; L. E. Reber, of Madison, Wis.; Sidney W. French, of Corvallis, and C. B. Watson, of this city, will meet in Ashland to prepare a report on the mineral resources of the state of Oregon. The appointees have been making an exhaustive investigation of the various geological formations and mineral belts of the state.

Brief News of the Week

Seventeen-year locusts are moving northward in Nebraska, after invading the southern part of the state, and have settled in Johnson county in large swarms.

Reports from Winnipeg, Man., say that crops in Manitoba and Saskatchewan are drying up under an intense heat wave, reaching at many points to 102 and 103 degrees.

The Serbian and Bulgarian governments have both agreed to accept Russian arbitration in their dispute over the territory acquired during the Balkan war.

The federal government has filed an anti-trust suit at Chicago against the Quaker Oats company. This company controls 90 per cent of the oatmeal products of the country, and is known as the "oatmeal trust."

The women suffrage bill has passed the lower house of the Illinois legislature by a vote of 81 to 58. It already has been passed by the senate.

Official notice has been issued from Sacramento to all railroad agents in California that every shipment of potatoes must be held for rigid inspection. The order followed the discovery of a shipment infected with the potato tuber moth.

American troopers were killed and 12 wounded in a desperate encounter at Bagnas with Moros under the sultan of Jolo, according to reports from Manila.

Appraisal of the estate of the late John Jacob Astor, one of the Titanic victims, has been completed at New York, and shows net assets of over \$85,000,000, of which nearly \$70,000,000 goes to Vincent Astor.

Orders have been issued by James J. Hill stopping all work on the Great Northern railroad lines that is not absolutely necessary, according to an announcement made at the general offices of the road. It was said the action was taken as a result of the recent supreme court decision in the Minnesota rate cases.

People in the News

G. M. Stramont of Pomona, Cal., has been elected commander of the California and Nevada department of the G. A. R.

Lieutenant-Governor Thomas Morris, a resident of La Crosse, has formally announced his candidacy for United States senator to succeed Isaac Stephenson.

It was announced that Theodore Roosevelt is going to Argentina next fall to lecture on the progress of the United States.

Atteaux, co-defendant with Wood in the dynamite planting case at Boston, has been set at liberty. The jury returned a disagreement as to Atteaux, the district attorney nolle prossed the case.

Madame Schumann-Heink has gone to her newly-purchased 1500-acre farm near San Diego, Cal., accompanied by her nine children, and it is said to be the singer's intention to give up her public career. Her place raises oranges, lemons and alfalfa.

"Jane Addams for mayor in 1915." This is the suggestion flying among Chicago club women and suffragists as the result of the action of the legislature in extending the franchise to women in Illinois.

The house of commons committee which has been investigating the "Marconi shares scandal" has presented a report to parliament substantially exonerating Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd-George and Solicitor General Isaacs from any wrong doing in connection with their purchase of American Marconi shares.

Chicago Women to Study Politics.

Chicago.—Special classes in politics for women are to be opened in some of the churches as soon as Governor Dunne signs the woman's suffrage bill passed by the legislature last week.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

The Bishop Scott grammar school for boys will be reopened in September on the new site near Yamhill, formerly known as North Yamhill.

The war department has awarded the contract for the building and erection of 11 lock gates in the Celilo canal at The Dalles.

President Wilson has nominated Milton A. Miller of Lebanon to be collector of internal revenue for the district of Oregon.

Governor West has appointed Arthur Clark, of Corvallis, prosecuting attorney of the fourth district, to succeed E. E. Wilson, who has sent in his resignation to become effective July 1.

To discuss general conditions and measures for the improvement of trees and crops, a meeting of all prune growers in the state will be held at Salem July 3.

State Game Warden Finley will liberate 1500 China peasannts this month in eastern Oregon counties. The fish car will be sent to Roseburg with 10,000,000 trout fry for planting.

The striking teamsters at Springfield have returned to work with no definite agreement as to wages, although it is said the city council is inclined to be liberal.

A campaign for a \$165,000 building fund for Albany College to erect buildings on the new campus, recently purchased southwest of Albany, was launched at the annual commencement exercises of the college.

Governor West has appointed Dr. Jules Fernando Morel, of Portland, until recently state veterinarian, a delegate to the department of agriculture of international exhibition to be held at Ghent, Belgium.

The desperado who was killed at The Dalles by Artie Harriman while the latter was defending his ranch home, was positively identified as Cecil Pettijohn by his half-brother, Thomas Pettijohn.

The salmon fishing season on the Rogue river in Curry county has opened, and the indications are that there will be a good catch. This is the first time that the river has been open to fishing since 1910.

Secretary of the Interior Lane has granted the petition of the Vale chamber of commerce and restored to settlement and entry 6000 acres of land along the Malheur river, withdrawn for reclamation purposes.

After a full consideration of the subject, the members of the state fair board have decided not to use a half-mile track this year for the harness races, but to use it only for the novelty and relay races.

A movement to save from the hangman's noose Robert Morgan, sentenced to death for the murder of Virgie Hart, his sweetheart, at Condon last year, has been inaugurated in Portland, and letters have been sent to Governor West urging commutation.

A bulletin prepared by State Dairy and Food Commissioner Mickle gives the value of the dairy output in Oregon in 1912 at \$19,000,000. No farm crop for that year is valued at more than \$12,000,000, the livestock industry of course exceeding that figure.

With two of the original members of the association present and with one graduate attending who has been present at every reunion for 23 consecutive years, the Alumni Association of Albany College met in 40th annual reunion at Albany.

S. Benson, millionaire timberman of Portland, will spend a fortune in an effort to secure the adoption of a constitutional amendment prohibiting the manufacture, importation and sale of whiskey, gin and similar spirituous liquors.

Secretary of the Navy Daniels has written to Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman that the petition, signed by more than 60,000 Oregon school children, that the battleship Oregon lead the parade through the Panama Canal at the formal opening, would be carefully considered.

That 35 clips of wool, amounting to over 750,000 pounds, will be offered at the wool sales at Condon is now assured. There are 20 clips in the warehouses now and others to come. The wool already there amounts to 1243 sacks, or approximately \$37,000 pounds.

The instructional work of the departments of mining, engineering and of forestry at Oregon Agricultural College will be reorganized before the opening of the next school year and the departments will in the future be known respectively as the school of mines and the school of forestry.

Announcement has been made that the girls' training school, provided for by an act passed at the last session of the legislature, would be opened July 1. The old polytechnic building on the grounds of the deaf mute home at Salem will be used until a building for which \$50,000 has been appropriated, can be erected.

Jack F. Adams, who was recently found guilty of murder in the first degree for killing Barney Chamberlain on the evening of February 7, is to be hanged at the state penitentiary at Salem Friday, July 15. That was the sentence pronounced by Judge Eakin of the circuit court at Astoria.
