Grooming Hodges for the Governorship

Boise Idaho Statesman:—Although the primary election for the selection of candidates for governor and other state offices in Idaho is a year distant, friends of particular favorites in the republican ranks are already advancing the claims of their "chosen sons" to head the ticket.
 The latest "boom" under way was launched tentatively and quietly during the last week from a source as yet unknown, with Arthur Hodges, mayor of Boise, as the proposed head of the Republican ticket. He has been freely mentioned also for secretary of state and it is now believed certain that his friends will persuade him to make the race for one or the other of the two offices during the next campaign.
 The mayor yesterday admitted that friends had suggested to him that he be a candidate either for secretary of state or for the governorship, but said:
 "I have not given the matter careful or even serious consideration. In the first place, I considered it too early and in the second I am devoting my attention to the duties of the office I now hold. There might be an entire change in circumstances between now and the beginning of the campaign so that any decision I might make now, one way or the other, would be reversed by the time of the election. I am not now a candidate for either the office of secretary of state or for the office of governor. Whether or not I will be remains for the future to determine."

Crook County Water Permits

During the quarter ending June 30, 1913, twelve permits have been issued by the State Engineer for the appropriation of water in Crook county. Perry A. South of Sisters, secured a permit to operate the water of Potter, Graham and Squaw Flat Canyons and tributaries for the irrigation of 144 acres, including domestic use. The water is to be diverted in Sec. 9, Tp. 13 S., R. 11 E. E. S. Payne of Lower Bridge, appropriates water from Squaw creek for the irrigation of 100 acres, including domestic use. C. M. Gardner of Paulina, for the irrigation of 120 acres; the water being diverted from Alkali creek in Sec. 7, Tp. 17 S., R. 24 E. C. N. Sorensen of Sisters, for the irrigation of 40 acres; the water being diverted from Squaw creek in Sec. 27, Tp. 13 S., R. 11 E. John G. Staff of Terrebonne, for the irrigation of 35 acres with the waters from Squaw creek, being diverted in Sec. 17, Tp. 14 S. R. 12 E. George Irwin of Vanora, for the irrigation of 15 acres of land, including domestic use, with the waters of the Deschutes river; the water being diverted in Sec. 31, Tp. 9 S., R. 13 E. The Ochoco National Forest Service has two permits for the appropriation of water for the irrigation of lands. One appropriation is made from Dry creek in Sec. 34, Tp. 13 S., R. 17 E. to irrigate 17 acres and the other appropriation

is made from Coyle and Canyon creeks in Sec. 35, Tp. 13 S. R. 19 E., for the irrigation of 12 acres. C. R. Conklin of Howard, for the irrigation of 20 acres of land with the waters of Duncan creek, to be diverted in Sec. 17, Tp. 14 S., R. 19 E. W. I. Dischman of Prineville, for the irrigation of 25 acres with the waters

of Mill creek to be diverted in Sec. 22, Tp. 14 S., R. 17 E. He also has an enlargement permit appropriating water from Ochoco river for the irrigation of 156 acres. The water for this permit being diverted in Sec. 6, Tp. 15 S., R. 17 E. H. W. Pickett of Barnes, appropriates water from the Crooked river for the irri-

gation of 101 acres of land. The water to be diverted in Sec. 23, Tp. 19 S., R. 22 E.

The State Engineer has issued 114 permits for the appropriation of water and the development of 14,000 horsepower, of which 15 are for the construction of reservoirs with a storage capacity of 377,487 acre feet of water
