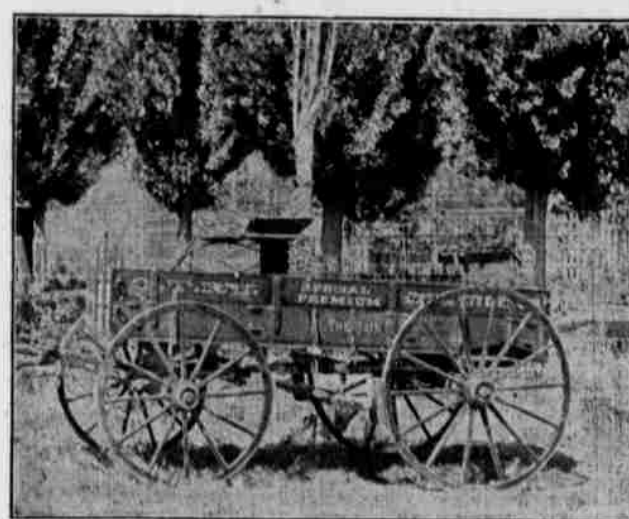
### Over 300,000 Acres to be Homesteaded

Washington.—Over 300,000

acres of land in Crook county, near La Pine, declared more valuable for agriculture than forestry purposes soon will be opened for settlement on the lottery plan.

Secretary Houston has advised Congressman Sinnott that he recommended the elimination of 24,000 acres from the Deschutes National Forest. Approval by the Secretary of the Interior is needed to complete the elimination, and this is expected within the next ten days from remarks Houston made to Houston, who has been working to secure the elimination for almost a year.

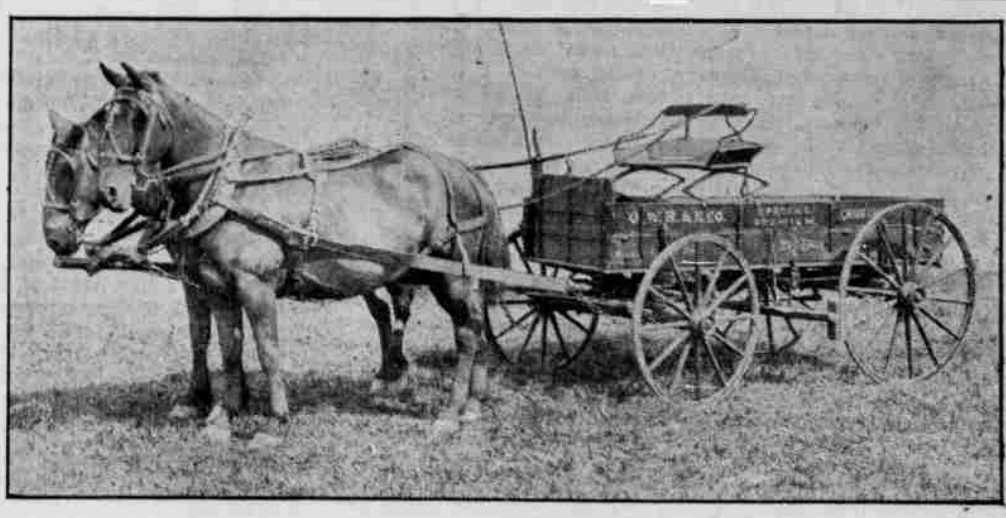
