Short of Feed  
Shaniko, Or.—The sheepmen in this part of Eastern Oregon are facing a serious problem, as to what to do for feed for their flocks when they bring them in from the summer ranges in the mountains, as this summer and fall have been exceptionally dry, and there is practically no grass on the home ranges. They have plenty of hay for winter feeding, but if they have to begin feeding as soon as the sheep come in from the mountains, and an early winter follows, hay may become scarce before spring. As a general thing the feed on the home ranges is good for a month or six weeks after the sheep are brought in from the mountains, about the middle of October, but this year is an exception, as there is no grass.
