How to Remodel Last Year's Suit. There are a good many modernizing touches which any home seamstress could give to last year's linen suit, and if you want to go to the expense of having a tailor remodel it he can do so

in a way that will make it look like

This year, like every year, shows plenty of straight tailored coats, slightly double breasted, with regulation cont sleeves and notched collars. They are little different from the plain tailor ed coat of last year, excepting they bulge a little more perhaps about the waist. But the more elaborate coats are, most of them, single breasted, and any tailor could make a single breasted coat of a double breasted one by cutting away the old coat and inserting a figured silk, crepon or cretonne waist-coat or one of contrasting material in

These little waistcoats, reaching a little below the waist and ending in points or belted into a belt of the same material, which books or buttons loose ly, are seen in many of the new coats. They are stitched at the edges to make them flat and to help them keep their shape, and they are generously decosoutaching in silk braid.

Another modernizing touch is the binding of silk braid. Many an old coat really looks well excepting that it has sagged a little about the bottom, and the edges look worn or shiny from laundering. Many of the new coats are bound about the edge with braid, which also binds the collars and cuffs and which is stitched down one or two seams of the skirts. The old cont could be trimmed where it has sagged so that it is even again and then bound with braid, either black or of a darker

shade of the color of the suit.

The braid binding, of course, makes washing of the linen suit difficult. Dry cleaning can be as easily applied to the braid as to the linen. A black satin collar, another popular feature of many of the season's suits, with cuffs to match, helps to make it unnecessary to wash it, and, for that matter, so does the braid binding, for it is always the collars and cuffs and the edges of the coat which first show soil.

How to Clean a Carafe.

Every housekeeper who owns a cut glass carafe has been up against the proposition of cleaning out the deposit on the inside. Hot water, besides belittle avail, even if it be very soapy. Here is a process which takes but a few moments and is very satisfactory Place in the bottle a teaspoonful of hydrochloric seid or spirits of salts; manipulate the bottle so that every portion of it shall be thoroughly rinsed The deposit, no matter how hardened, will be removed immediately. When the carafe has been thoroughly cleaned riuse well in clear water.

How to Make Raspberry Sauce, For this use one pint of raspberry

juice, two teaspoonfuls of flour or one of cornstarch, one-half cupful of sugar and four eggs. Beat the eggs well and mix the flour with a little water till smooth, then put all into a saucepan with the sugar and the Juice. Set In another pan of boiling water and stir constantly till the sauce thickens. A few crushed berries may be added if desired. This is a good sauce for use with any simple pudding.

How to Clean Silver Quickly.

Put a handful of salt or soda in any aluminium vessel (pan or dish) place the silver to be cleaned in this dlah, cover with water, lift out and rub dry with linen towel. The silver will be brighter than if silver paste or polish were used, and this method takes less time.

HEALTH HINT FOR TODAY.

How to Guard Against Tubercu-

Avoid badly ventilated, badly lighted, dusty, dirty, overheated, crowded or damp rooms. Breathing dust, notably house

dust, often causes disease. Have no tacked down carpets and mattings. Have loose pieces of rugs and clean them frequenty outdoors.

Keep lower sashes closed while sweeping or dusting. Open upper

Never sweep rooms with broom that raises dust.

Drink pure water. Avoid water from shallow and unprotected wells and from ponds and streams.

If in doubt boil the water. Avoid public drinking cups. Tuberculosis, typhoid fever and other diseases are often caused

by drinking dirty raw milk and Investigate your dairyman Patronize the dealer with clean,

up to date methods. Take a bath or sponge daily and a warm bath, followed by a cold splash, plunge or shower, once or twice a week or oftener. Use somp freely.

Wash your hands before handling food.

Don't put fingers, money, paper or pencils in your mouth.

Don't bite your finger nails. Clean your teeth morning and

evening. Don't ent raw food that was exposed to flies or dust or touched by unclean hands. Fruits or vegetables so exposed should first be rinsed or washed thoroughly.

Treatment of Scalp.

To stimulate the hair roots and scalp and to improve the circu-lation of the blood grasp a lock of hair close to the scalp and pull firmly in a kind of jerky fashion, but not too hard, of Begin at the front and go all over the head to the back. If the hair is already falling some persons hesitate to pull at the scalp, but their fears are groundless, because when a hair is separated from its papilla it is practically dead, and it is better to have it come out as soon as possible, as it only delays the growth of the new hair coming in its place.

Pain In the Ear.

not pour bot oil into the ear to relieve pain. Heat can be applied much better in a hot mixture of glycerin, sloohol and water, which will not turn rancid or clog up the ear and can be removed by syringing with water.

A towel or large pad of gauze wrung out in bolling water and closely applied over the ear, covered with oil silk or protective rubber tissue, is better than a hot water bag. This is because more or less steam from the moist cloth enters the ear and softens the tissues which are in

A still better and almost infallible way to relieve pain in the ear is to invert a funnel over a bowl of boiling bot water and let the steam from the small end he funnel hot as it can be borne.

For Hard Hands.

When the hands are dry and either from housework or cold bran water will be found very soothing. To obtain the water put bran into a cotton bag and boil for twenty minutes. When necessary to wash the hands during the day use the bran water, diluting with hot or cold water, as desired. If this is persisted in it will keep the bands smooth and white.
