The 17 mills will enable the school directors to meet all expenses without resorting to temporary loans, near the close of the year, to meet current expenses, thus saving interest money to the taxpayers.

Again in 1852, under the territorial organization, I was elected sheriff; served two years and was re-elected, serving two consecutive terms. B. F. NICHOLS."
