GOVERNOR URGED TO PARDON Women Protest Hanging One of Own

Sex in Connecticut.

Hartford, Conn.-Governor Baldwin of Connecticut is being deluged with petitions from every part of the United States urging him to extend clemency to Mrs. Bessle J. Wakefield, who has been sentenced to hang March 4 for the murder of her husband. The petitioners are for the most part women, although there is a sprinkling of men. These appeals vary in tone. Many argue the case opposing hanging in general or hanging women in particular. Many appeal to the governor's sense of chivalry. A large percentage make the assertion that to hang a woman will be to disgrace Some threaten. the state.

Mrs. Wakefield is only 26 years old. She was convicted of killing her husband, William Wakefield, largely as a result of the testimony of her accomplice, James Plew, a farmhand. Plew also has been convicted and sentenced to death.

Tide Lands Belong to People.

San Francisco, Cal.-Affirming the doctrines that the tide lands of Callfornia belong to the people of the state in their sovereign capacity and that the legislature or other official bodies have no power or authority to sell them, the supreme court returned a sweeping decision that will affect the titles of millions of dollars of water front property.
