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## MONROE DOCTRINE QUESTIONED IN CHILE

### Colonel Roosevelt and Chilean Ex-Diplomat in Heated Argument.

Washington.—Members of the diplomatic corps, especially representatives from the South American countries, were greatly interested in a report reaching Washington that ex-President Roosevelt and Dr. Marshall Martinez, at one time Chilean minister to the United States, clashed in Santiago de Chile on account of divergent views on the Monroe doctrine.

The reported debate attracted unusual interest here because both of the prepared speeches were reviewed before delivery by the Chilean foreign office.

In his address at the Roosevelt re- the Monroe doctrine as a dead issue and arguing that the conditions which gave rise to its promulgation by President Monroe in 1823 have almost entirely disappeared.

This statement is said to have aroused the ire of Colonel Roosevelt, who replied with some heat, holding that the Monroe doctrine still was a vital principle of the foreign policy of the United States.

He is said, too, to have suggested to the Chilean diplomat incidentally that it was ill- advised on such an occasion to inaugurate a controversy.

Nothing official has reached the Chilean legation here concerning any phase of what diplomats are it clined to consider a delicate situation.

## KILL MEXICAN PLOTTERS

### All of Commissioned Officers of Battalion Suffer at Guaymas.

Hermosillo, Sonora.—The commissioned officers and many sergeants and corporals of the Tenth battalion of the federal garrison at Guaymas were executed in that city, according to word brought here.

Officers and men of the Tenth were disarmed several days ago by General Ojeda, federal commandant, when he discovered they were plotting to desert to the insurgent side.

Accompanied by three of the federal officers who surrendered to the insurgents at Maytores, General Obregon, field commander of the constitutionalists in western Mexico, returned here to assist in locating the scattered groups of federal soldiers who had deserted from the Guaymas garrison.

## REVOLUTION IN MEXICO

FEBRUARY. Revolution in Mexico headed by Col. Felix Diaz. President Madero besieged in his palace. The revolutionist leader Gen. Bernardo Reyes killed in battle.

A truce reigned between Madero's government and the Mexican revolutionists.

The Mexican revolutionists and government forces bombarded each other's positions with heavy artillery.

Mexican forces continued artillery firing in the streets of the City of Mexico. The revolution gained fresh adherents.

Fighting continued in the City of Mexico. Government troops revolted. Madero agreed to resign the presidency.

President Madero resigned his office after arrest by Gen. Blanquet, one of his officers.

Gen. Victoriano Huerta, commander of the national army, assumed the presidency.

Gustavo Madero, brother of the deposed Mexican president, was killed by the revolutionists.

Gen. Victoriano Huerta elected provisional president of Mexico.

Huerta's government in Mexico, composed of Huerta, assumed the presidency.

Resignation of H. L. Wilson, ambassador to Mexico, accepted by the president. Ex-Governor John Lind of Minnesota sent as a special envoy to Huerta's government in Mexico.

Special Envoy Lind left the Mexican capital and returned to Vera Cruz, declaring that his mission to Huerta was a failure.

President Wilson delivered a message to congress on the situation in Mexico.

Provisional President Huerta of Mexico arrested the chamber of deputies and assumed the powers of dictator, dissolving congress.

Foreign envoys in Mexico asked their governments to send warships to guard the legations.
