THE matrimonial difficulties of Prince William of Sweden, King Gustavus' second son, and his Russian wife, Grand Duchess Marie, are causing a profound sensation in Europe because they involve affairs of the highest importance to the Russian crown.

The vital question at the imperial court is, "Who will succeed Nicholas II. upon the throne?" No one believes that the czar's little son will ever live to reign. If he should he would be a physical wreck and could not hope to leave a son himself to carry on the direct line. The czarina is now forty-one years old and has been in such bad health for years that the pros-pect of her presenting another heir to the crown is small.

The czar's only brother, Grand Duke Michael, formerly the heir apparent before the birth of little Czarevitch Alexis, positively refuses to consider a return to that position. He has quit the country with his morganatic wife and children, and it is said that wild horses could not drag him back as his brother's successor to the gloomy pomp and terrifying dangers of the imperial crown.

The males next in line after him are the sons of the late Grand Duke Vladimir, Grand Duke Cyril, Grand Duke Boris and Grand Duke Andrew. But their father and they themselves after him have reduced the national treasury when in positions of authority and have so openly defied the people's welfare that neither one of them could possibly ascend the throne without anarchy, assassination and their attendant horrors.

The spirited, pleasure loving little Marie, known as the "Merry Grand Duchess," who married Prince William of Sweden five years ago, when she was only eighteen, has developed extraordinary intellectual 'qualities and diplomatic tact, and she has become the life and soul of the political group at the St. Petersburg court in favor of proclaiming the czar's eldest daughter, Grand Duchess Olga, the heir of

Victims of a System of Averages Used by Middlemen.

Washington -The office of markets of the department of agriculture has made an investigation of the irregularities in prices paid for cotton from the time it is burvested until it reaches New York. The investigators re ported that in some sections of the cotton belt the farmers are cheated out of from \$1 to \$12.50 a bale by the middlemen and the carriers, by a system of averages.

COTTON FARMERS CHEATED.

"The cotton crop of Oklahoma for 1012," says the report, "contained about 19,000 bales of strict good mid-dling cotton on which the New York differences would entitle somebody to a total of over \$20,000 in premlums above the prices of good middling. No one in that state who was interviewed admitted having received a cent of this premium.

"The investigation showed that in the case of strict middling cotton in same local market, the difference the in price for bales of this grade would vary from \$2 to \$7.25. In the case of low middling cotton in seven markets, the price variation on the same day was from \$2.20 to \$12.50 a bale. In the case of low middling cotton the variation ran from \$2.50 to \$3 per bale."


"PET" WILDCAT ESCAPES. Kills Two Tamed Ones Right Off Be-




