I hope and assume that the present administration is merely making itself acquainted with the situation. When it gets the facts I have not the slightest doubt that it will see its duty as we have seen it who have been there. This is to encourage the Filipinos to take as active a part in the government as it is safe to have them take, but to retain a controlling hand while they are in their tutelage, while they are learning political self restraint.

It will take certainly two generations, perhaps longer, for them to do this, and for us to promise within any definite time to give them independence is very foolish. It would be a failure in duty to them. It would be a failure on our part in maintaining the self respect that we ought to have in discharging a responsibility that has come to us under circumstances we could not control and which we are quite able to dis-barge with comparatively small effort. We shall make a serious mistake if we follow the eloquence of the smooth spoken Filipino politicians who are looking hungrily for the exercise of a power which they are Ill adapted to wield for the benefit of their own people.-William


