Whereas, it appears a petition has been filed with the city council of the city of Prineville, Oregon, by more than twelve freeholders of said city, praying that East "F" street between the south line of First street, south to the corporate limits of said city, be graded, graveled and improved.

And, whereas, after due consideration it is made to appear that it will be to the best interests and welfare of the said city and its inhabitants that said street be so graded, graveled and improved as in said petition requested.

Now, therefore, in pursuance to the foregoing petition and the authority vested in the city council by Sections Forty to Fifty five, both inclusive, of Chapter Seven of the City Charter of the city of Princville. Approved the 16th day of February,

The people of the city of Prineville,

Oregon, do ordain as follows: Section 1. That East "F" street from the south line of First street south to the corporate limits of the city of Prineville, Crook county, Oregon, be and the same is hereby or dered to be graded, graveled and improved, and that the costs and expenses of such grading, graveling and improving, be charged against and made a lien upon each and every parcel of land, lot or lots within the limits of the proposed improvement for the full costs and expenses of making the same upon the half of the street adjoining said parcel of land, lot or lots,

Section 2. That said grading, graveling and improving be made to conform to the established grade, or which may bereafter be established for sald street, and be made in all other respects as the city council shall see fit.
