it with their personal accounts and checking it out in a way that gives the county court no opportunity to check the expenditures and no opportunity to account to the taxpayers for the moneys expended.

Wherefore, in view of the apparent total inadequacy of the system now employed, we recommend that a voucher system be installed whereby the court can check over every dollar expended by any road supervisor, similar to the system in use by the United States Forest Service, and that each road supervisor be required to use the system proposed before county moneys will be available for his use; and we further recommend that County Treasurer Jordan be appointed by the county court to devise a satisfactory system of checks and accounting for the use of the road supervisors.

We recommend that the state weed law as found in the Session laws of 1913, Chapter 394, be enforced by the county court and the road supervisors, but we do not recommend that a special appropriation or special levy be made or any public expense be incurred therefor.

We think also that the county high school board should make provisions to have all doors at the high school open outward as provided by law and that all inside doors should swing both ways. The present arrangement of doors, especially those on the back stairway of the main building is quite unsatisfactory and most decidedly dangerous in the event of fire, aside from being a violation of the statute.

We visited the Home Hospital and find conditions there satisfactory as far as we were able to discern. The building is sanitary and the appointments there seem to be suitable for such an institution.

We visited the high school and commend the work being done there and we recommend that the agricultural course and the other practical branches taught there be kept up to the present degree of efficiency.

We visited the offices of each of the county officials and while our examination was necessarily brief, we found the offices apparently well conducted with a due regard to the duties imposed by law, as far as we were able to judge.

Having concluded our labors, we respectfully ask to be discharged.

To renew these brands I have adopted the plan of recording the brand in the same way that it was first recorded. By doing this it will be necessary to file a leather with the brand burned upon the same, together with the application for recording the brand. The fee for recording is 50 cents. Ordinance Number 211

An ordinance providing for the grading, graveling and improving of East F street from the south line of First street, south to the corporate limits of the city of Prineville, Oregon.

Whereas, it appears a petition has been filed with the city council of the city of Prineville, Oregon, by more than twelve freeholders of said city, praying that East "F" street between the south line of First street, south to the corporate limits of said city, be graded, gravelled and improved.

And, whereas, after due consideration it is made to appear that it will be to the best interests and welfare of the said city and its inhabitants that said street be so graded, gravelled and improved as in said petition requested.

Now, therefore, in pursuance to the foregoing petition and the authority vested in the city council by Sections Forty to Fifty five, both inclusive, of Chapter Seven of the City Charter of the city of Prineville, Approved the 16th day of February, 1909.

The people of the city of Prineville, Oregon, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That East "F" street from the south line of First street south to the corporate limits of the city of Prineville, Crook county, Oregon, be and the same is hereby ordered to be graded, gravelled and improved, and that the costs and expenses of such grading, graveling and improving, be charged against and made a lien upon each and every parcel of land, lot or lots within the limits of the proposed improvement for the full costs and expenses of making the same upon the half of the street adjoining said parcel of land, lot or lots.

Section 2. That said grading, graveling and improving be made to conform to the established grade, or which may hereafter be established for said street, and be made in all other respects as the city council shall see fit.

Section 3. Passed by the city council and approved by the mayor of said city, on the 3rd day of March, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fourteen.
