New Football Rule Bars Side Line Coach.

FRANCIS QUIMET'S PLANS.

Open Golf Champion to Sail April 14.
Philadelphia May Row in Olympic Games—Add \$10,000 to Kentucky Derby—Limit School Athletes to Twenty Years.

The intercollegiate football rules committee, meeting in New York, decided that hereafter coaches should be barred from the lines. This was the most radical change in the rules adopted at the meeting, which was one of the shortest in the committee's history. Other changes were as follows:

Intentional grounding of a forward pass was penalized by the loss of ten yards from the point of scrimmage. When the ball from a free kick hits a goal post and bounces back into the field the play is counted as a touch-back.

After the teams line up the team having the ball shall not enter the neutral zone in short formation.

A player out of bounds when the ball is put in play penalizes his team by the loss of five yards. Under the old rule there was no penalty for this offense the first time it was committed.

Although the proposal to number players, grade the value of a field goal according to the distance of the kick and move the goal posts back were discussed, no action was taken on these and other points. Chairman E. K. Hall of the committee announced that the committee had decided to wait and observe how the plan of numbering players worked out among the college teams which have voluntarily decided to adopt this system of identification during 1914.

Following the suggestion of Walter Camp, teams were given the right to use a fourth official in their games if they desired. This official will be known as "field judge" and his status will be further fixed by the codifying committee, consisting of William Langford, Trinity; W. N. Morice, Pennsylvania, and Nathan A. Tufts, Brown.

Plans are under way to have Philadelphia represented in the rowing races in the Olympic games at Berlin in 1916 by having crews in every event. Details are being worked out by William B. West of the West Philadelphia Boat club.

He has selected a committee consisting of George W. Orton, the trainer of the University of Pennsylvania track team; W. A. Stecher, director of the athletic work of the Philadelphia public schools, and W. J. Harman, a gymnastic instructor, to pass upon the fitness of candidates for the crews.

James B. Juvenal, the former champion sculler of Philadelphia, will be the chief coach.

The crews will be picked from the membership of all the rowing clubs in Philadelphia and from other applicants who may develop into good oarsmen.

Francis Quimet, the American open golf champion, arranged to sail on April 14 for England, where he will play in the amateur and open championships next spring. He will be accompanied by Arthur G. Lockwood, formerly of Weston-super-Mare, England, who has been in this country twelve years and is ranked among the leading amateurs here.

Upon reaching Liverpool Quimet and Lockwood will visit the nearby links of Hoylake and then journey leisurely to the south of England, arriving early in May at Sandwich, where the amateur championship will be played. Their stay there for the first time will be brief. When they return a week before the championship tournament, which begins on May 18, they expect to be joined by J. D. Travers of Upper Montclair, N. J., the American amateur champion; Frederick Herreshoff of New York and Heinrich Schmidt of Worcester.

The open championship will be held at Prestwick, Scotland, beginning June 11. After the play there the American golfers will visit France. Quimet expects to return in time to defend his title in this country.

The Kentucky Derby for 1914 will be the richest Derby ever run over the course at Churchill Downs. The New Louisville Jockey club has added \$10,000 to this event, which is the largest amount that has ever been added to the classic event since the first Derby was run in 1875. The largest amount ever added was \$6,000, while as a rule the added sum was \$4,000 or \$5,000. With the usual number of entries the \$10,000 added will bring the total value of the Derby to \$14,000 or \$15,000 and will make the race worth to the winning horse between \$10,000 and \$12,000.

The board of control of athletics of the board of education of Chicago voted to make the age limit for athletes in the schools twenty years instead of twenty-one years, as it is at present. This will limit the competition in athletics in the schools to students who are not over twenty years of age.

The finance committee of the city council of Vancouver, B. C., recommended that permission be granted for short boxing bouts not exceeding ten rounds. An effort will be made to open the game with a match between Harlem Tommy Murphy and Wolgast.

Penn's football team will play a game with the Navy eleven next fall, Oct. 17 is the date agreed upon. Aside from the annual game with the Army the game with the Quakers will be the first one the middies have ever played away from home. A two year contract has been signed. The Navy contest is the only new addition to the Quakers' schedule, which has just been published. Penn State and Brown have both been dropped. No midweek games will be played this year.
