GUNBOAT'S COMPLAINT.

Able Fighter Says Buckley Just Drives Him Toward Money.

The "Gun" said that he had had sixty battles in his short and sweet young life, forty of them resulting in knock-outs to the other fellow. The "Boat" is sailing along fine on the theatrical sea of prosperity. Smith is drawing down a salary of 1,000 iron men every week. He has seventeen weeks of this kind of "soft going," which will take him pretty much all over the country. Smith punches the bag, shadow boxes, does a little callisthenics, makes a couple of bows, then beats it for the dressing room. "I know," said Gunboat, "getting the coin-like this is softer'n takin' candy from an infant, but my manager, Jim Buckley, just drives me to do it, so what's a fellow gotta do?"

South Atlantic Meet For Baltimore.

Johns Makes Promise to Cut Down Taxes

Portland Attorney in Race for Republican Nomination on Business Administration Platform.

On a platform that promises to reduce taxes, cut the expenses of state offices to a minimum, abolish all unnecessary boards and commissions, and to reduce the expenditures of all commissions not abolished, Charles A. Johns, attorney of Portland, is making a clean-cut race for Republican nomination for Governor.

Although Mr. Johns has resided in Portland only two years, he is a pioneer of Oregon. He was Mayor of Baker for four terms, and School Director of that city eighteen years. He has received the unqualified indorsement of all bankers of Baker of his candidacy.

Regarding his platform, Mr. Johns says: "Expenses of the State of Oregon showed a material increase for 1913-14 over 1903-04. That was natural. But the increase was more than \$3,000,000; that is outrageous.

"This unnecessary increase—out of all ratio with the growth of Oregon—with its almost unbearable burden to taxpayers of the state, is my first reason for entering the race for Governor.

"Fair-minded voters will concede that there should be a material increase in the expenses of the office of Governor for 1913-14 over 1903-04; but there is no valid reason why this increase should be \$14,700. This is entirely indefensible. It cost \$11,000 to conduct the office of Governor for 1903-04; in 1913-14 the appropriation for the same office was \$25,700.

"The appropriation in 1903-04 for the office of Secretary of State was \$24,300, and in 1913-14 it was \$48,900, an increase of \$24,600. The office of State Treasurer cost the taxpayers \$10,600 for 1903-04, but increased to \$25,550 for 1913-14. An appropriation for the office of Attorney-General increased from \$7,200 for 1903-04 to \$24,600 for 1913-14. There are no valid reasons for these excessive increases, and I promise in my platform, if elected Governor, to cut down these expenses of such of these offices, thereby reducing taxes. I consider this a sacred promise and will keep it.

"Other excessive appropriations were for boards and commissions. These expenditures increased from \$47,600 in 1903-04 to \$1,174,931.54 for 1913-14. If elected Governor I will abolish all unnecessary boards and commissions and make a material reduction in the expenses of those not abolished.

"The increase in the expenses for State government from \$2,192,451.52 for 1903-04 to \$4,174,475.17 for 1913-14 is excessive, and I promise in my platform to show a material decrease in this expenditure and a consequent reduction in taxes.

"My record as Mayor and as School Director of Baker shows the affairs of these offices were conducted at a minimum cost and on a business basis, and that the service was efficient. For this reason, I received the unqualified indorsement of the three banks of Baker. Officers of these banks say over their signatures that, in our judgment, as Governor, he could and would do the same thing for the State.

"The State of Oregon needs a clean cut, business administration, and as Governor I can and will give it that kind of an administration."

WHAT HIS OLD NEIGHBORS SAY.

To V. Ross H. May Concern: Charles A. Johns was a continuous resident of Baker City for twenty-four years, during which time he served four terms as Mayor and eighteen consecutive years as School Director.

As Mayor he gave the city an honest, efficient administration, and the financial affairs were conducted on a close, safe, economical basis and at the very lowest expense to the taxpayers.

As School Director he always worked for the best of the pupils and for economy in administration, with insuring the high standard of the Baker City schools. In our judgment, as Governor, he could and would do the same thing for the State.
