154 Water Permits Issued During Quarter

During the quarter ending March 31st, 1914, State Engineer John H. Lewis issued 154 permits for the appropriation of water, including eight permits to construct reservoirs. Under these permits it is proposed to irrigate 28,994 acres of land, develop 21,968 horsepower at an estimated cost of \$2,500,000.
