

Harlem Tommy Intended to Be Bellhop, Not Fighter. HAS HAD HARD SETBACKS.

In 1905 Was Knocked Out In First Round by Terry McGavern - Came Back Strong Against Abe Attell-Unable to Wrest Title From Johnny Kilbane-Looked "All In" Once.

There's a unique story in Harlem Tommy Murphy. Murphy in the beginning intended to become a bellhop If he didn't make good as a boxer. He never hustled ice water, however. In 1905, his third year in the fistic game, he was knocked out by Terry McGovern in a round. A person would naturally think that such a defeat would have ended Tomray, but he was back soon and boxed Abe Attell. Since then he has been boxing nine years.

In 1911 Murphy took the knockout from Kayo Brown. It was not an honest knockout-that is, Murphy was sup-

posed to take it, and he did get it. We are told that the blow that finally put him down was a socker that would have finished any one. Both the Mc-Govern and Brown sleepers came in the first round.

Tommy had "downs" besides these, but in his last fight for the championship of the world he gave Title Holder Ritchie a rugged argument. Now he is matched with Freddie Welsh, British lightweight champion. Some crisscrossed record!

Originally the frishman lived in Greenpoint, a suburb of Brooklyn. He Straight arm blows are what he always was a pal of George Hoey, a sensational featherweight whom Johnny Oliver was grooming at the Polo club. punch. Hoey wouldn't box for Oliver, how ever, unless he would stake Murphy

At that time Tommy was a con-sumptive looking boy. He had more ambition than Hocy and put on the gloves every day at the Polo. In a few months Murphy began to Impress Oliver, who paid him considerable attention. Hoey was a grand fighter, but was lazy. Murphy never loafed.

Oliver matched Murphy up and ba bled him along. He got Frank Erne I Casper Leon to teach the kid, and

MURRAY A REAL FIGHTER.

But California Middleweight's Looks Belie His Calling.

After reading about Billy Murray, the "new Stanley Ketchel," one looks forward to seeing a doughty little bruiser with all the eccentricities of the original "Assassin."

To tell the truth, young Mr. Murray looks just like any other human being dressed in a fine dark blue suit, cut along the latest lines. The grunt one expects when addressing him doesn't happen, and the fighter says things in

the most intelligible way. His language is excellent, and there is even the absence of "dese" and "dose." so common in the present generation of those who follow the game of fists. Aside from a cut over his left eye inflicted by Leo Houck in the bout that made Murray famous, Murray could be taken for nothing else than a successful young business man. He'd be taken for anything but a fighter. He doesn't taik fight, either, except when he is queried on it. But he's a fighter just the same. His record of forty-two fights, thirty-eight of which he won by knockouts, proves that.


Jack Kearns, who knows a fighter when he sees one, is his manager, Kearns, it may be remembered, piloted Dick Hyland during the latter's successful campaign of the rings all over the country. He has other good ones, too, but was dull in the game until he got his eye on Murray in those four round bouts in Frisco. Kearns busied himself getting the boy under his management, and since he has been with him he has improved greatly in boxing. Proof of that was shown when he went along for twenty rounds with Jimmy Clabby, generally regarded as the cleverest middleweight in the world. Kearns has been borne out by the boy in all the fights he has had him in, and now he cannot see anything but undisputed right to the middleweight title before many months. Murray has a reach that is wonderful. It measures seventy-four inches, The boy is loose jointed and according to Kearns never swings a punch employs, and behind every one of them there is the weight of a heavyweight's

Right now Murray can go in the ring at 150 pounds, but any man who can scale at 160 ringside will be welcomed as an opponent.

ENGLISH RACER'S COLOR.

The Tetrarch is Mottled Gray, Like Circus Horse.

Racing news from England just now contains much about The Tetrarch, the favorite for the Derby, who was scratched at the last moment.

The Tetrarch is a mottled gray colt. French bred, by Roi Herode-Vahren. Not only is his mealy gray color out of the common, but in addition he is garnished with a big bay patch on his side, which gives him a resemblance to a circus horse. In speaking of his winning his races last season with consummate case, there is no exaggeration. In like fashion to Old Rosebud he jumped off, with lightning-like strides in the first quarter and spread eagled his field.

This colt is owned by Captain D. McCalmont and is trained by H. S. Persae, the same who trained and rode jumpers for the stable of Mr. Chamblet of Brookline in the days of the Duke of Abercorn, etc. Whether as a three-year-old he is going to prove himself as great a prodigy remains to be seen. He will have every opportunity of distinguishing himself as a marvel of the century, as he is engaged in every one of the classic events.

So far as the color of the colt is concerned it is an old adage, "A good race horse is never of a bad color." Of the many gray horses that have been seen on the track a very big percentage have been race horses better than the average. In the last score of years quite a few can be called to mind-Bonz. Cambyses, Lizle, Lucas, Oriflamme, Sparke, Derby, Beimar, Oxford, Gray Friar and others.
