A crowd of six or seven hundred people are expected if the weather is favorable. The floor for the new Pringle Flat Improvement Club Hall will be finished by the Fourth so that dancing may be in order during the evening. The musicians have been contracted for, so with the athletic events in the morning, then an old-fashioned picnic dinner in conjunction with a cafeteria lunch that the ladies will run on the side, followed by the ball game in the afternoon and many other attractions, is calculated to furnish amusement and diversion for one and all for the entire day.

The Pringle Flat Ball Club had a very enjoyable trip to Roberts last Sunday and appreciate the hospitality and courtesy extended to them by the people of Roberts. Everyone enjoyed the game, including the umpire. The rivalry was strong and the game proved to be exciting and close all through. The Pringle Flatters pulled off four double plays during the seven innings, thereby keeping the heavy sluggers of Roberts from reaving wild on the bases. Result Still in the Air.

A recheck of all the counties in Oregon in the vote cast for Judge Henry L. Benson of Klamath county and Chas. L. McNary of Marion county, candidates for Republican nomination for Justice of the Supreme Court, resulted in a majority of 16 votes for Judge Benson, according to the figures made public by expert accountants who have been handling the matter for Judge Benson. The recheck shows that Judge Benson gained 66 votes in various counties and lost 9, making a net gain of 57 over the original returns of the Secretary of State. According to the recheck, Benson's total is 34,662 and McNary's total is 34,646.
