Events Occurring Throughout the State During the Past Week.

Express Company is Indicted.

Salem.-An indictment was returned by the Marion county grand jury against the Great Northern Express company on the charge of violating the law regulating the shipment of liquor properly labeled into dry terri-

This indictment is probably the first one returned in the state for violation of this law. It resulted from the shipment of a gallon of wine by the Rose City Importing company to J. A. Benjamin, assistant attorney general. Because the package was not properly labeled Salem police officers seized it. It is alleged that investigation showed that the importing company had properly labeled the package, showing its true contents, but that the express company had covered the importing company's label with its shipping label, thus causing the package to be shipped in violation of the label requirements of the law.

Medford Guardsmen Plan Club.

Medford.-Because there is no Y. M. C. #### LIST OF FOOD IS MADE

The Requirements of a Workman's Family of 5 Computed.

Wash.-Eight hundred pounds of potatoes, 686 pounds of flour, 683 pounds of meats of various kinds and 260 pounds of sugar are among the principal items of a list, regarded as necessary for the maintenance of a workingman's family of five persons for one year. This has been compiled by Labor Commissioner Olson for the purpose of showing the comparative cost of living for a workingman in various parts of the state. He is getting price quotations now in all sections of the state on the list, which comprises nearly 4000 pounds of food of all kinds.
