OREGON ROBBERS MAKE CONFESSION

Two of Three Men Who Held Up O.-W. R. & N. Train Captured Near La Grande.

Pendleton, Or.-Albert Meadors and Clarence Stoner, two of the three train robbers who held up O.-W. R. & N. train No. 5 near Meacham the morning of July 2, were arrested Sataurday night about 9 o'clock by Deputy Sheriff Batchelor, of La Grande,

The leader of the gang, who was shot and killed by Deputy Sheriff George McDuffy at the time of the holdup is Charles Manning, a professional gambler and not Hugh Whitney, the notorious outlaw. All three of the robbers were from Cokeville, Wyo. Manning has a wife and four children in Cokeville. He was a close personal friend of both Hugh and Charles Whitney, while Stoner is a cousin of the Whitney boys.

When arrested the two train robbers were walking along the railroad track in the direction of La Grande and less than 20 miles from the scene of the holdup. Neither man was armed and they offered no resistance when placed under arrest. They had \$385 in cash and the \$700 diamond ring taken from H. B. Rovce, the Walla Walla brewer, who was a passenger on the train, and a smaller diamond, but the diamonds were thrown away when they were arrested to prevent their being used to connect them with the holdup.

The capture of the entire gang of robbers within three days after the holdup sets a record for the apprehension of train robbers in the west, it

NEWS FROM OUR NATIONAL CAPITAL

New York, Pennsylvania and Illinois Lead in Income and Corporation Excise.

Washington.-Net York, Pennsylmania and Illinois paid more than half of the \$71,386,146 turned into the national treasury in income and corporation taxes during the fiscal year just closed. A detailed statement of collections made public showed that these three states contributed \$37,-931,717.

New York alone paid \$12,528,247.03 in individual income tax, while the entire amount paid by individuals throughout the country was \$28,306,-236.69. The empire state paid \$9,766,-248.57 of the \$43,079,810.44 paid as

corporation tax by all states. Pennsylvania ranked second in both individual and corporation taxes. Its corporations paid \$6,096,305.28 and its individual income tax collections amounted to \$3,176,095.28. Illinois was third in the list, with corporation taxes amounting to \$4,293,649.68 and individual incomes aggregating \$2,-076,171.11.

Will Prosecute Income Tax Dodgers. Nation wide investigation of the re-

turns in the income tax filed by corporations and individuals has been begun by agents and inspectors working at the direction of Commissioner Osborne of the internal revenue, to ascertain the correctness of each payment into the treasury.

Fraudulent statements in attempts to evade or defeat the assessment required by the law are held to be a misdemeanor and the person or officer of any corporation rendering a false return is liable to a fine not exceeding \$2000 or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both, at the discretion of the court.

Officials of the treasury declare the pursuit will be relentless and those caught in the dragnet which is being thrown out will be required to pay the additional amount of their tax or face suits of prosecution.

Borah Continues to Fight Harbor Bill. There is little likelihood that the fight being made against the river and harbor bill in the senate will accomplish its defeat, though it is believed that the bill cannot go into effect much before August and may not become operative until a later date.

Senator Borah, of Idaho, who is holding up the bill, intends to hold up the conference report later, unless congress grants some of the legislation asked by the west. As a means of accomplishing his purpose, he has offered an amendment to the bill authorizing a loan of \$50,000,000 to the reclamation fund, and is demanding that that amendment be accepted by the senate. His contention is that the river and harbor bill, with few exceptions, carries no direct benefit to the states, where the government is building irrigation works.

Colombian Treaty is Likely to Fail.

The administration by a party vote will be able to secure a favorable report from the foreign relations committee of the senate on the Bryan treaty with Colombia, but senators or posed to that document assert positively that the administration will not be able to force ratification by the senate. It requires a two-thirds vote to ratify and more than a third of the senate are said to be opposed to the

It is said that leaders are hoping amendment to the constitution will be had in the house about August 1.

The United States has been asked by Consul General Cheshire of Canton. China, to send aid for the 2,000,-000 people who are said to have been rendered destitute by the recent floods in two southern provinces of China.

The house passed the bill repealing the provision that anyone who was in any way active on the side of the rebels during the civil war should not be eligible for the collection of claims from the government. Claims totaling \$165,000,000 will thus be revived,

President Wilson will fill all vacancies where negroes are now employed by other negroes, in accordance with a promise which he made about the time of his inauguration. White men will not take the places of the blacks.

The San Dominican situation continues to be a puzzler for President Wilson. He admits having received a report that the American gunboat Machias had fired on one of the warring factions because they had violated an agreement not to bombard the rebel city.

Ordinance Number 213.

An ordinance providing for the supply of the City of Prineville, Oregon, and its inhabitants with water for public and private use, and granting to H. S. Cram a franchise and license to construct and operate a system of water works in the City of Prineville, Oregon, and providing for an option to purchase said water works system by the City of Prineville.

The people of the City of Prineville.

The people of the City of Prineville, Oregon, do ordain as follows:
Section 1. The privilege is hereby granted to H. S. Cram, of Prineville, Oregon, his successors and assigns, for and during the term of fifteen years subject to the right of purchase and forfeiture hereinafter brovided, to erect, construct, maintain and operate a system of water works in the City of Prineville, Oregon, for the purpose of supplying pure, living water for municipal and domestic purposes.

Section 2. The water to be sup-

Section 2. The water to be sup-plied under this license shall be pure living water and shall be procured plied under this license shall be pure living water and shall be procured from springs without the city limits, and conveyed from such springs in closed ducts or pipes to an open reservoir outside of the city, from which reservoir the same shall be transmitted through a distributing system of pipes twelve inches in diameter to the center of distribution.

Section 3. Such reservoir to be provided by grantee, shall have completed said installation not later than the 1st of October, 1915.

Section 12. Should the grantee fall to begin or complete the construction of the said waterworks within the time limits herein set forth, then and in that case this franchise shall be forfeited and this ordinance shall be null and void.

Section 13. Whenever the words grantee and city are used herein, they are understood to mean H. S. (7 cam and the City of Prineville, respectively.

Section 3. In the event grades of streets have been established the city agrees to make good any expense to which the grantee may be put if the city shall hereafter lower the grade of any street or streets, where the grade is now established, provided that prior to the lowering of such grade the city shall have given due notice to the grantee lowering of such grade the city shall have given due notice to the grantee of its intent to change the grade, and the grantee shall have filed objections to said contemplated change. In cases not falling within this proviso the city shall not be held liable for any expense to which grantee may be put by the lowering or changing of the grade.
