The suggestion of Attorney-Gen-The fourth annual Redmond Po- eral Crawford that the act appropriating \$450,000 for the remation of the land by the state, provided that settlers who did not desire to enter into new contracts with the state should be reim-Columbia Southern Company, was discussed. It was decided that the money could be raised either through the sale of lands or by legislative appropriation.
