Tumalo Project to be Completed

Salem, Or.—After a conference with Project Engineer Laugaard the State Desert Land Board decided not to discontinue work on the Tumalo irrigation project.

The suggestion of Attorney-General Crawford that the act appropriating \$450,000 for the reclamation of the land by the state, provided that settlers who did not desire to enter into new contracts with the state should be reimbursed for expenditures to the old Columbia Southern Company, was discussed.

Mr. Laugaard said that settlers entitled under the law to about \$15,000 under the act had given notification that they did not want new contracts and that those entitled to about \$85,000 had not expressed themselves either way.

It was the unanimous opinion of the Board that the work should not be stopped, the Attorney-General explaining that he simply called attention to the provision of the law so the settlers would know where they stood.

George West said that he believed a majority, if not all, of the settlers would sign new contracts when the project was finished.
