Over 300,000 Acres Open to Entry in Oregon

Washington, Dec. 3.—Orders were issued today by Secretary Lane opening to homestead entry more than 560,000 acres of Western public lands which have been determined to be non-irrigable. After January 11, 1915, the lands may be taken up in tracts of 320 acres each under the

enlarged homestead act.

More than 300,000 acres of the property is in Central and Eastern Oregon, in Wasco, Crook and Grant counties. In Montana there are about 100,000 acres, mostly in Chautau, Fergus and Custer counties, and more than 160,000 acres in New Mexico, in Guadalupe, Roosevelt and Chaves counties.
