

## QUIET IS RESTORED AMONG FILIPINOS

Uprising Declared to be Small and Was Quickly Suppressed.

Washington.—Details of native uprisings in the Philippines, beginning Christmas eve, were given in a cable message received from Governor-General Harrison.

The report minimized the extent of the trouble, but said that small bodies of Filipinos had assembled in Manila and Navoko Christmas eve, and attempted to make trouble. As a result 40 men were arrested and one man was shot by a policeman.

Governor-General Harrison reported that the disorders had been suppressed; that everything was quiet and efforts were being made to arrest the leaders.

He added that nobody of any influence or standing was concerned in the movement; that it was "small and unsuccessful" and was connected with the campaign of Ricarte, who has conducted a revolutionary propaganda from Hongkong for several years, appealing to the most ignorant classes of Filipinos.

President Wilson favors the passage of the Jones bill at the present session. Officials close to the White House said that the recent troubles would not affect Mr. Wilson's advocacy of the bill, in view of the quieting reports submitted by the war department.

Resident Philippine Commissioner Quezon said there were no specific grievances against which the Philippine people could complain and that "there is absolutely nothing in the talk of a revolution."

## PLOT NIPPED IN BUD

Eight Ringleaders Arrested at Manila and Native Gatherings Dispersed.

Manila.—Eight Filipinos were under arrest here, and the arrest of more was considered likely, in connection with what appears to have been a concerted attempt at a local native uprising Christmas eve.

It is said army officers were warned in advance, the number of conspirators being placed at 10,000. The attempt was a complete fiasco, however, native gatherings being quickly dispersed in various places, and from all indications, the authorities had the situation well in hand.

The plot is attributed to the activities of Artemio Recarte, a Filipino now in exile in Hongkong.

It is disclosed that secret agents of the Philippine constabulary who are members of the secret societies disclosed the plans for an uprising, thus enabling a force of constabulary and police to disperse gatherings at Bagumbayan, Race and Navotas.

The nationalist newspapers accuse the other political parties of fomenting the revolt and they also hint that some Americans were concerned in it in an effort to quash the Jones bill, which contains provisions for a greater measure of self-government for the islands.

## Real Dry Arizona After First.

Phoenix, Ariz.—Arizona's prohibition amendment, which goes into effect at midnight December 31, will be strictly enforced. This was made plain by Attorney General Jones, who issued orders to every district attorney in the state to do his full duty wherever the law is concerned.

## Noted Prelate of San Francisco Dies.

San Francisco.—Most Rev. Patrick William Riordan, archbishop of the archdiocese of San Francisco of the Catholic church, died at his home in this city at 6:05 A. M. Archbishop Riordan contracted a severe cold, which developed into pneumonia.

## Washington Hears Bryan Will Retire.

Washington.—The Christmas season political rumor is that William Jennings Bryan is to retire soon from the cabinet, and is to be succeeded as secretary of state by Senator Stone, of Missouri.

## Highest Templar is Dead.

Troy, N. Y.—Colonel Arthur MacArthur, grand master of the grand encampment of Knights Templars of the United States, died suddenly of apoplexy at his home here. He was 64 years old.

## Admiral Dewey is 77.

Washington.—"The Grand Old Man" of the navy, Admiral George Dewey, who is in fine health and spirits, celebrated his seventy-seventh birthday Saturday by receiving hundreds of friends.

Daughter Born to Queen of Italy. Rome.—A daughter was born to the queen. This is Queen Helena's fifth child. Four of them are girls.

President Wilson is Fifty-eight. Washington.—President Wilson celebrated his 58th birthday Monday.

## NACO IS NEUTRAL GROUND

As Result of General Scott's Intercession Fighting is Stopped.

Washington.—Secretary Bryan received word unofficially that the plan proposed by Brigadier-General Scott, chief-of-staff of the United States army, for the prevention of firing into American territory along the Mexican border, has been agreed on by all factions.

Enrique C. Lorente, Washington agent of the Gutierrez government, of which General Maytorena at Naco is a supporter, was advised that the latter had accepted the plan suggested by General Scott. It provides that General Hill, of the Carranza forces, should abandon Naco and be permitted to go unmolested to Agua Prieta, already held by a portion of his troops and General Maytorena, who has withdrawn his forces southward from Naco, would agree not to occupy Naco, Sonora, which would thenceforth become absolutely neutral.

From the American point of view the arrangement was favored because fighting at either Agua Prieta or Nogales would not be close enough to the American towns to produce the same situation as had existed for several months at Naco, where stray bullets constantly fell on American soil.

## 21 Ships to Trail Oregon in Canal.

Washington.—Twenty-one modern battleships flying the Stars and Stripes will follow the Oregon, the old buldog of the navy, through the Panama Canal, when the Atlantic fleet goes to participate in the opening ceremonies of the Panama-Pacific exposition.

## 93 POLITICIANS IN INDIANA ARRESTED

Indianapolis.—Virtually every member of the city administration of Terre Haute is in the hands of United States authorities as a result of the wholesale arrests there on indictments charging a conspiracy to corrupt the election of November 3 last.

Ninety-three persons including Mayor Roberts, who is a candidate for the democratic nomination for governor in 1918; Dennis Shea, sheriff of Vigo county; Circuit Judge E. H. Redman; City Judge Thomas Smith and other leading Terre Haute politicians had been taken into custody.

Mayor Roberts, who is regarded as the leader of the alleged conspiracy to corrupt the Terre Haute election, is charged with many overt acts in the indictment.

It is charged that the postal laws were violated in that the alleged conspiracy was furthered through the mails. The federal authorities contend that inasmuch as a United States senator and a congressman were voted upon, the federal government has jurisdiction in the case.

## GERMANS ABANDON BZURA CAMPAIGN

Berlin Admits Attacks Have Ceased But Reports Gains Elsewhere.

Berlin.—Features of the war in the eastern arena are the admission of the Germans that they have ceased their attacks along the Bzura river and the admission of Vienna that superior forces of Russians in Galicia have succeeded in recapturing Krosno and Jaslo. Paris says the Germans have been driven back across the Bzura with heavy losses. The Germans, however, assert that they have been successful on the right bank of the Pilica, and Austria asserts its troops have taken Anjak Pass, in the Carpathians.

Both Germans and Russians tell of having taken many prisoners.

The German official press bureau, according to a wireless communication from Berlin, says:

"Russian attacks in the vicinity of Lotzen have been repulsed and we took 1000 prisoners. In North Poland, to the east of the Vistula, the situation remains unchanged. We have ceased our attacks on the Bzura river. On the right bank of the Pilica, to the southeast of Tomaszow, our offensive has been successful. Further to the south the situation remains unchanged."

## Czar Denies Sale of Isls.

Petrograd.—The Russian government has authorized the official news agency to deny in the most categorical manner the statement that Russia has ceded to Japan half the island of Sakhalin, in exchange for heavy artillery. It is asserted that the report is absolutely unfounded.

## ITALY READY TO AID U. S.

Cruiser Ordered to Help American Warship in Turkey.

Rome.—Instructions have been sent to the Italian cruiser Calabria, now at Beirut, Syria, to assist the United States cruiser North Carolina, if the necessity should arise as the result of further demonstrations against the departure of Europeans from Turkish territory. The cruiser Tennessee, the fuel ship Vulcan and the gunboat Scorpion, of the United States navy, which also are looking after American interests along the eastern Mediterranean, are ready to steam to any place where they are needed, according to reports received here.

London.—A dispatch from Athens says it was the United States cruiser North Carolina which threatened to use its guns at Tripoli, Syria. The North Carolina, convoying the American steamer Virginia, had proceeded to Tripoli and the commander requested the Turkish authorities to permit the British and French consuls to depart with their nationals resident in Tripoli. This request was refused.

## 18,500,000 Men Fighting.

London.—The belligerent armies in the fields of war number, all told, nearly 18,500,000 men, or 28,000,000 with all reserves and "new" troops counted, according to a French statistician, M. Yves Guvot.

## BRITISH ATTACK GERMAN BASE

London.—Assisted by light cruisers, destroyers and submarines seven British naval armaments, piloting seaplanes, made a daring attack Christmas day on the German naval base of Cuxhaven, at the mouth of the Elbe.

Six of the armaments returned safely, but the seventh, Commander Hewlett, it is feared, has been lost, as his machine was found off Heligoland, wrecked.

What damage was done by the bombs thrown by the attacking party could not be ascertained, but the German report of the affair says that the raid was fruitless.

By rapid maneuvers the British ships were able to avoid the German submarines, while the Zeppelins found the fire of the cruisers too dangerous for them to keep up the fight. German seaplanes dropped bombs, which, according to the British account, fell harmlessly into the sea. The Germans, however, reported they hit two destroyers and their convoy, the latter being set afire.

## Diplomatic Issue Raised in Belgium.

London.—British authorities were advised that Germany had announced its refusal to recognize the exequaturs of British consuls to Belgium. This is regarded as preliminary to Germany's formal taking over of the government of Belgium.

It is believed here that refusal to recognize Brand Whitlock as United States minister to Belgium would follow as a matter of course.
