

Recorder Hyde Makes Report

The city recorder's office paid Prineville a revenue of about \$150 last year.

Recorder Hyde in making his report for the year just closed states that \$339.50 was received in fines during 1914 from a total of 52 convictions, or an average of a little more than \$6.50 each.

Seventy persons were arrested during the year, from which there were 60 convictions. Eight of these were either released on suspended sentence, escaped from custody or served out their fines in jail.

May showed more arrests than any other month, 34 persons having been arrested during that month. February, December and June showed ten each and March and April each have nine arrests recorded. During August and November but one arrest each month was made. There is no apparent explanation for the unusual number of arrests and convictions during May.

Fair Association Elect New Officers

The Crook County Fair Association held its annual meeting Monday. A board of directors was elected for the coming year and other important business transacted.

Henry McCall, E. T. Slayton and J. B. Shipp are the new board. There will be a meeting of this board in a few days and a president and secretary will be chosen for the coming year.

Plans for the fair were discussed and more publicity, earlier publication and a revision of the premium list, later date for the fair and a number of other things were recommended to the new board. Prepare for a good fair next fall.

Sheriff Chrisman accompanied Marks to his ranch and Pettis surrendered. Pettis then was taken to the Brown ranch on the Deschutes river, arriving there at daylight. Pettis told Marks he was afraid that Brown was going to try and get his recently filed-on homestead away from him. Before leaving after the shooting Pettis searched the house and hid \$40 worth of postage stamps he had found. He told the sheriff he did not want anyone else to get them while he was away. Pettis had hung the mail sack on the crane in the morning, as Mr. Brown had ordered. It is believed Pettis became crazed by drinking a quantity of liquor left at the Brown ranch by fishermen.

While at Gateway, Brown had bought a watch for Pettis, having it in his grip when slain.
