### **Recorder Hyde** Makes Report

The city recorder's office paid Princville a revenue of about \$150 last year.

Recorder Hyde in making his report for the year just closed states that \$339.50 was received in fines during 1914 from a total of 52 convictions, or an average of a little more than \$6.50 each.

Seventy persons were arrested during the year, from which there were 60 convictions. Eight of these were either released on suspended sentence, escaped from custody or served out their fines in jail.

May showed more arrests than any other month, 34 persons having been arrested during that month. February; December and June showed ten each and March and April each have nine arrests recorded. During August and November but one arrest each month was made. There is no apparent explanation for the unusual number of arrests and convictions during May.


