Want Jitney Busses Regulated.

Salem.-Asserting that the Portland traction company is losing more than \$500 daily by the operation of jitney busses in the congested districts of Portland. Attorney Harrison Allen is in the state capital conferring with the railroad commission, preparatory to having a bill introduced which will curb the operations of these vehicles.
