BRIEF WAR NEWS

America's objection to Germany's principle of submarine irresponsibility in British coast waters, is the most serious war development of the past week. Publication of the texts of the notes sent to Great Britain and Germany, respectively, revealed that both countries had been warned in most emphatic terms from menacing the vessels or lives of American citizens traversing the recently proclaimed sea zones of war.

Germany was advised that the United States "would be constrained to hold the Imperial government to a strict accountability" for such acts of its naval authorities as might result in the destruction of American vessels or the loss of American lives, and that "if such a deplorable situation should arise," the American government would "take any steps it might be necessary to take to safeguard American lives and property."

To Great Britain the United States pointed out "the measure of responsibility" which would seem to be imposed on the British government "for the loss of American vessels and lives in case of an attack by a German naval force," if England sanctioned the general misuse of the American flag by British vessels, and thereby cast doubt on the valid character of the neutral ensigns.

The greatest number of aircraft ever assembled during the war was that which, under the direction of Flight Commander Grahame-White, thirty-four in number, raided the towns on the Belgian coast, which the Germans are attempting to convert into a submarine and airship base against Great Britain. The raiders are reported to have gotten away without losing a machine, although two were hit. Grahame-White, well known as an airman in this country, fell into the sea, but was pulled up by a British cruiser.

In France, Flanders and Alsace there has been little or no fighting of importance, so far as the official reports disclose.

Dutch Send Protests.

The Hague, via London.—The Netherlands has maintained the strictest neutrality by presenting notes of protest at the same moment to Germany and Great Britain, regarding the acts of these governments in respectively declaring a war zone of the waters around the British Isles and in using neutral flags.

World Gun Record Made.

Beacon, N. Y.—William Ruf, a gunpointer on the United States battleship Texas, who is visiting his home here on furlough, was notified that he set a new world's record in marksmanship with the big guns during recent target practice.

Ruf was credited with eight straight hits with a 14-inch gun, shooting at a moving target 12 miles away.

Italy Protests to Germany.

Rome.—Italy made virtually the same representations to Germany as did the United States, concerning neutral shipping in the sea war zone created by the recent German proclamation.
