BRITISH BLOCKADE OF GERMANY BEGUN

Endeavor Will be to Stop All Commerce to and from German Ports.

London.—Great Britain made known to the world in a formal proclamation how she proposes to sever all the arteries of sea commerce to and from Germany during the period of the war. The term "blockade" is not used and no prohibited area is defined. Nevertheless, the text of the order makes plain England's purpose—to prevent commodities of any kind from reaching or leaving Germany during the war.

The British order states that neutral ships and lives of non-combatants will be spared. Disposition of captured cargoes will be left to prize court, if not requisitioned by government, payment for seized cargoes not to be made until peace, unless goods had become neutral before issuance of order.

In the last clause of the proclamation is the proposal most interesting to neutrals. This is a flat agreement to lift the "blockade" in case any nation will certify that the ships flying its flag shall not carry goods to Germany, or originating therein or belonging to the subjects of the German empire.

It is notable that the order declares no intention to capture ships proceeding to and from Germany's allies, Austria and Turkey, the reason being, no doubt, that the measure is avowedly a reprisal against the German submarine warfare.

Vigorous Protest Expected.

Washington.—Great Britain's order in council explaining her embargo on all commerce between Germany and neutral countries was received with such evident disappointment by high officials of the United States government that a strong protest against its terms was considered in official quarters as certain to be made soon.

GERMAN STATEMENT MADE

Minister Will Continue War Until Proper Guarantees are Obtained.

London.—A Reuter dispatch from Berlin by way of Amsterdam quotes the German minister of the interior and vice-chancellor, Clemens Del Bruck, as declaring in a speech in the upper chamber Germany's intention to continue the war until she obtained the guarantees she desired.

"If we were satisfied merely with repelling the enemy," said the vice-chancellor, "we should soon have peace. But we cannot rest satisfied with that alone; we shall not sheath the sword until we obtain guarantees that our enemies will not attack us again. Discussion of these guarantees at the present moment would not further German interests."

Ordinance Number 220

An ordinance entitled an Ordinance to regulate the use of stoves for heating water, rendering lard and tallow, within the fire limits in the City of Prineville, Oregon, defining what shall constitute violations hereof, and providing a punishment therefor.

The people of the City of Prineville, Oregon, do ordain as follows: Section 1. That from and after the taking effect of this ordinance, all stoves or other heating apparatus, within the fire limits, which are or shall be used for the purposes of heating water, rendering lard, tallow or other fatty substances, and situated in the rear rooms or other remote place of any business building, and not in the immediate personal view and control of the proprietor or his employees, while fire is therein, shall be placed upon a platform of brick, stone, cement or gravel at least four inches thick, and said platform shall not be less than five feet square, at the outer edge of said platform there shall be built thereon a substantial wall of brick, stone or cement to a height equal to the height of fire box of said stove or heating plant, or in lieu thereof, a sheet iron or sheet steel box, of equal height, and whether built of brick, stone, cement or sheet steel or sheet iron, if desired, a sheet iron, or sheet steel door may be placed in one side of said wall, for the convenient use of fuel, or wood in said stove or stoves.

Section 2. That any person or persons who shall violate any of the terms and conditions of this ordinance, or who shall neglect or refuse to comply herewith, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction in the recorder's court of the City of Prineville, Oregon, shall be fined not less than ten dollars, and not more than one hundred dollars, and pay the costs of prosecution, and in default of the payment of such fine and cost, shall be confined to the city jail one day for each two dollars of such fine and cost not to exceed thirty days.

Section 3. Owing to the fact that there are no ordinances governing the use of such stoves in such places, and that this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the City of Prineville and its inhabitants, and on account thereof an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall therefore take effect from and after its approval by the mayor of said city.

Section 4. Passed by the city council this 2nd day of March, 1915, after the third reading.
