Mrs. Wenandy a Suicide at Bend

Mrs. J. H. Wenandy, wife of "Jack" Wenandy the Bend automobile and liveryman, committed suicide at the Wenandy home in Bend this morning some time after midnight.

Mrs. Wenandy was last seen alive about midnight. She had been talking to Mr. Wenandy who has been in Portland for the past week or ten days and it is said that something that concerned the conversation had over the telephone had something to do with the act.

Coroner Poindexter and County Physician Rosenberg left for Bend this forenoon where an inquest will be held this afternoon. Examination by Bend physicians revealed the fact that Mrs. Wenandy had taken enough strychnine to kill a dozen people.

The Wenandys have been married less than a year. Mrs. Wenandy was formerly a school teacher at Crescent, Oregon; was about twenty-five years of age, and highly respected in the community. She had many friends in Bend who are greatly shocked by the tragic death. It is believed that domestic troubles were entirely responsible for her action.
