Free Seed Corn

Because of the many requests coming to this office for information in the matter, we wrote Mr. C. L. Smith of the O-W railway asking for information about the free seed corn his people propose to distribute to the farmers of Oregon this year. At the same time we offered to pay the freight from Redmond to Prineville on any shipment that his people would make of a thousand pounds or more of seed for the farmers in this locality. The reply to this letter, which is self-explanatory, is as follows:

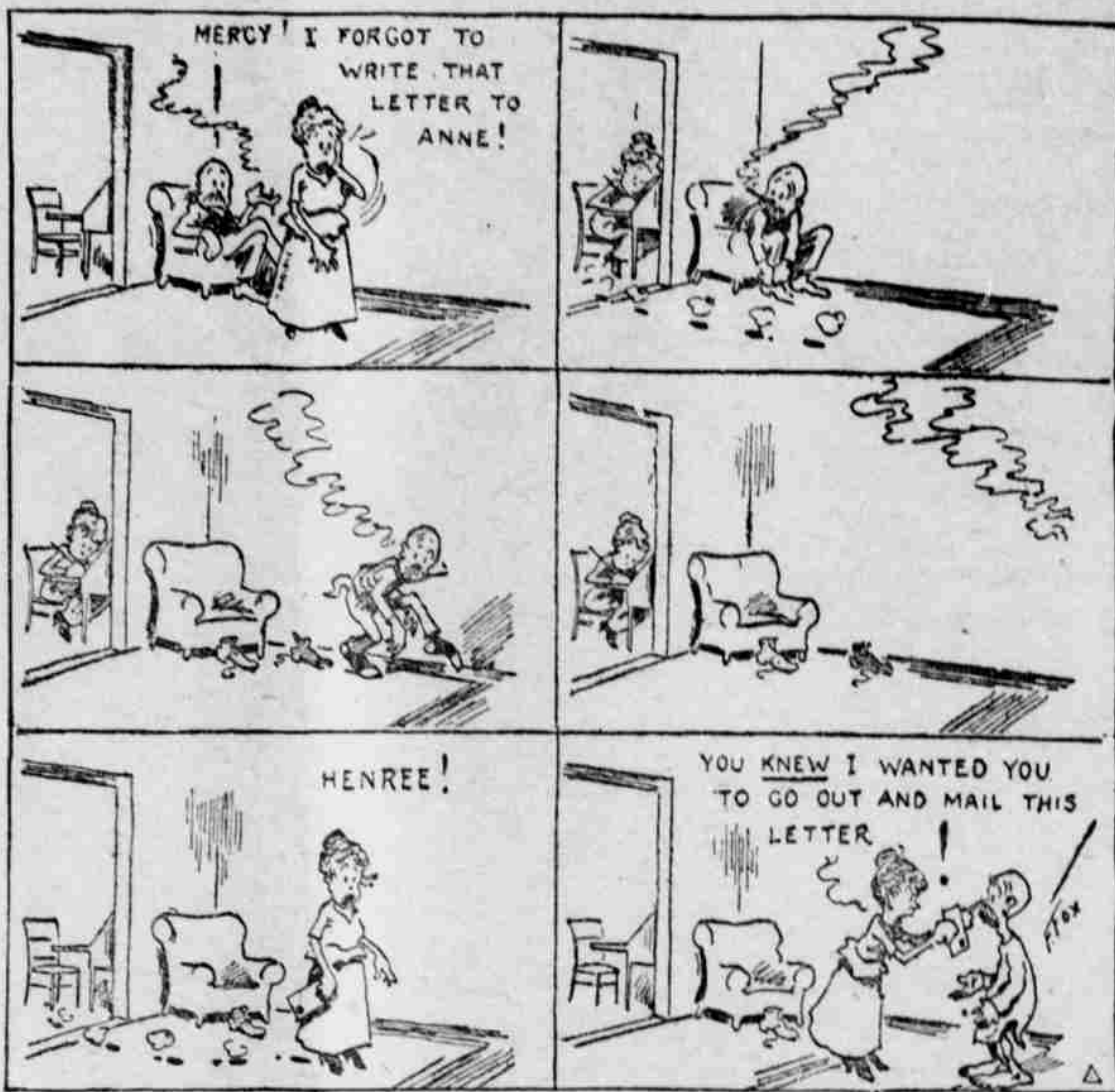
In reply to your letter of March 4 will say that we will be glad to furnish seed corn to farmers in the Prineville district or anywhere else in Crook county delivery to be made to the nearest O-W railway agent.

Regarding your offer to handle such corn from Redmond to Prineville free of charge I appreciate your interest in the matter. Am enclosing some seed corn arguments under separate cover; am sending you some of our corn primers. Under this agreement we furnish seed enough to plant two acres. When a man plants two acres we prefer to send two or more kinds. Then he may save seed from the kind that gives the best results. If any farmers desire more than 20 pounds that we furnish free he can get same at a reasonable price from Mr. J. W. Duff, of 391 Glenn Ave. Portland Oregon.

The seed we distribute to the Prineville district will be from farmers in Wasco county grown at an elevation of 2000 feet. Corn grown in that section from 5 to 25 years and is therefore thoroughly acclimated. Notice in the corn literature sent you that we urge growers to save their own seed. The longer corn is grown in any given locality the better the results.
