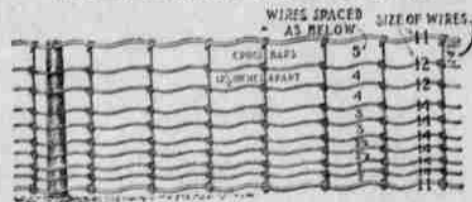

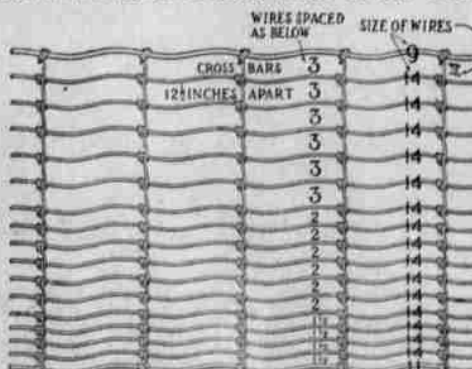

Stretches of 150 to 190 feet are frequently made with Page wire for foot and sheep bridges across the rushing mountain streams of Southern Oregon.

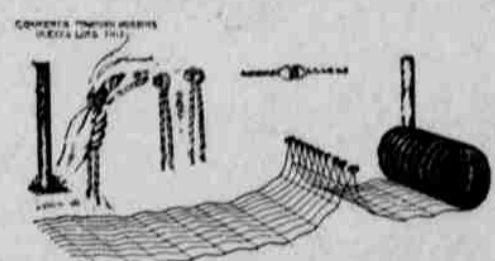
About two weeks ago a suspension v-bridge of Page wire was made in Crook county, on the H. S. McCall ranch, that has a span of 2200 feet and carries a deck load of 1400 feet of lumber. In a photograph made of this structure there were fourteen people standing in the middle of the span and the drop or sag does not amount to more than three feet. These bridges are built at a fraction the cost of cable and take but little time.

PAGE METHOD OF SPLICING BOTH QUICK AND SECURE



Loops are turned at the factory in each end of every line wire of Page fence, and every roll of fence contains a bunch of small coils by the use of which two rolls of fence are joined together in the same manner as you would place two keys on a ring at the same time, thus joining your fence together quickly and securely.
