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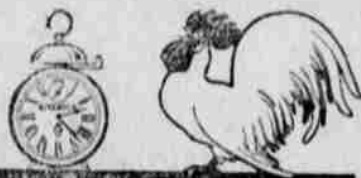
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Above we show the BURSON and the 'others' turned inside out-note the difference.
