over a different road from which we entered and here was a sign:

GOOD BYE
COME AGAIN!

Looking back we saw that it was a two-sided sign—Welcome coming in and Good bye going out. If I am ever within bounds of Cenral Oregon again I am going through Prineville if it is a hundred miles out of my way. I want to encourage such signs, particularly when they so perfectly express the natural courtesy and hospitality of a city. And I am inclined to think that many a progressive, booming town that does not have behind it 45 years of existence as has Prineville, might cultivate the same general air of hospitality to the visitor. I believe it would appeal to the intending settler or the casual visitor perhaps as favorably as smokestacks and other monuments of progress.

I would not advise any city copying the same example of Prineville unless the sign can be made an expression of the hospitality of a people. Otherwise that "good-bye" would be but a mockery and its effect the opposite intended.

Resolution: Mutually agreed by both Courts that the indebtedness of Crook County on January first, 1915, as far as shown by the report of Mr. Max Crandall made at the request of the joint courts, was the sum of \$84,884.76; it is further mutually agreed that this report is not a complete statement of the indebtedness of Crook County on said date.

Resolution: Unanimously agreed by both courts that all question of law involved in the interpretation of Chapter 10 of the General laws of Oregon for 1913 be submitted to the District Attorneys of Crook and Jefferson Counties with instructions to meet together and determine the question submitted; it is further resolved that if the said District Attorneys cannot agree upon any one or more of the questions of law submitted to them for their joint opinion that they be instructed to proceed forthwith in person to Salem, Oregon, and obtain an opinion from the Attorney General of the State of Oregon on the same.

Resolution: Resolved that the District Attorneys report their final opinion on the questions of law submitted to them to a special committee composed of one member from Crook and one from Jefferson County Court to be appointed by the respective judges thereof; further that said committee on receiving instructions proceed forthwith to list and appraise the property of Crook County according to the report of said District Attorneys; Further that said special committee report to the joint county courts as soon as possible. Roscoe Gard of Jefferson County, dissenting.

Special Committee appointed as follows:

H. J. Overturf appointed by Judge Springer for Crook County; J. M. King appointed by Judge Boegli for Jefferson County. Joint session of Crook and Jefferson County Courts convened this twenty-third day of June at the hour of nine A. M. Same officers present from both courts as yesterday.

eleven o'clock this twenty-fourth day of June, 1915; when were present the following officers:

G. Springer, judge, presiding; J. F. Blanchard, commissioner; H. J. Overturf, commissioner.

Whereupon the following proceedings were had to-wit:

The following warrants drawn on the Road Fund of Crook County are hereby ordered cancelled: Class B, Nos. 853, 854, 857, 827, 828, 829, 830, 842, 843, 844, 845, 846, 847, 859, 862, 863, 864, 867, 870 877, 882, 858, 884, 885, 848 and 878.

Order a warrant drawn in favor of E. B. Knox, Sheriff, for stamps in the sum of fifty dollars.

Resolution adopted directing the preliminary survey of the proposed C. H. Daecly road by the County Surveyor and requesting a report on the same forthwith. (see resolution)

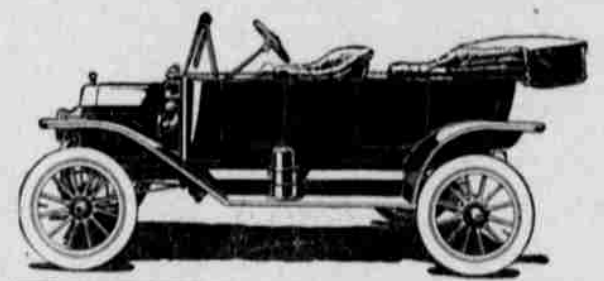
