Telephone Matters Slated for

#### Consolidation May Result

ple of the Support of Two Different Systems

Crook County completed the filing of complaints yesterday with the public service commission against the Pioneer Telephone company and the Pilot Butte Telephone company both of this city to compel these rival companies to abolish one of the central stations in this city, and elfrom the business houses and resi-

The action is brought because of the inconvenience and injustice caused by the existence of the two rival

At present the territory is perhaps about evenly divided between the two companies, both claiming an advantage in the matter, and the subscribers on either of the lines are unable to talk to those on the rival lines because of the fact that the two companies have been unable to arrive at an agreement for switching privileges, and there are no trunk lines connecting the two services. This is the reason for the county asking the state authorities to assist in settleing the difficulty.

When interviewed, Manager Pope of the Pioneer company stated that if his company had the control of the town business, they would install a common battery system of the latest tpye, in this city, one that would call central without ringing, and posessing many other improvements.

A date will be set for the hearing by the commission who will no doubt come here for that purpose. It will perhaps be some months in the future before the matter is finally se
