VILLA WILLING TO CONFER

Outlook for Villa-Carranza Conference Said to Be Getting Brighter.

Washington.—Miguel Diaz Lombardo, minister for foreign affairs in the northern branch of the convention government of Mexico, arrived here to join Enrique C. Lorente, Washington representative of General Villa, General Felipe Angeles and Manuel Bonilla, former cabinet minister under Madero.

The Villa leaders have been conferring informally with officials and have recorded their willingness to enter into peace negotiations with General Carranza looking to the establishment of a new provisional government which might receive immediate recognition from the United States.

The arrest of General Huerta and the vigorous pursuit of his associate have caused much satisfaction in both Villa and Carranza quarters here.

Sixteen Hurt in Train Smash

Ashland, Or.—Nine passengers and seven employees were injured in the yards here when an excursion train going from Montague, Cal., to Grants Pass crashed into two helper engines. The most seriously injured is Loyal Taylor, fireman in one of the helper engines, whose hip was broken.

General Orozco Has Disappeared

El Paso, Tex.—General Pascual Orozco, Huerta's chief lieutenant, has disappeared, eluding six secret service men guarding his apartments. It is feared that he has jumped his bail bond of \$7500 and is now safe in Mexico.

Diaz Dies in France

Paris.—General Porfirio Diaz, former president of Mexico, died here. General Diaz had been in failing health since reaching Europe in 1911 after his resignation from the presidency of Mexico following the Madero revolution.

EDISON WILL HEAD BOARD OF INVENTORS

Civilian Board to Work Out Ways to Perfect Fighting Machinery is Plan.

Washington.—The United States is to have the greatest combination in the world on the civilian board of a bureau of development and invention in the navy department.

Orville Wright is understood to be scheduled to join Thomas A. Edison upon the board, which is now being organized. Edison will devote himself to the development of submarines, while Wright will give his attention to aviation. While the electrical wizard and the aeroplane inventor will not be limited in their work to any particular field, Secretary Daniels regards the submarine and aircraft as likely to play the most important part in the sea warfare of the future, and is desirous that they receive the greatest attention from the new board.

Formal acceptance of Thomas A. Edison as head of an advisory board of civilian inventors and engineers for a new bureau of invention and development in the navy department was presented to Secretary Daniels by M. R. Hutchinson, the famous inventor's personal representative.

In a letter to Edison, Secretary Daniels outlined his plan for an advisory board of civilian inventors to aid the navy in working improvements to meet the changed conditions of warfare as demonstrated in the European conflict. The secretary is especially interested in the development of the aeroplane and submarine. In mentioning the change in conditions of naval warfare as brought about by the submarine, he wrote that he was confident Edison's inventive genius would aid the navy toward meeting "this new danger with devices that will assure peace to our country by their effectiveness."

With the example set by Edison, it is expected that all other inventors who are asked to accept a place on the advisory board will promptly accept. Edison and Wright are selections of Daniels, but the secretary will consult Edison as to the personnel of the remainder of the board.

FRENCH OVERLOOK PLAIN OF FLANDERS

On the Heights of Notre Dame De Lorette, near Arras, France, via Paris.—After battling 120 days for the hilly country between Bethune and Arras, the French forces are in possession of all the eminences looking out upon the plain of Flanders. Lille, Douai and Cambrai all are visible from here.

Every position along the broad national road between Arras and Bethune has been won except Souchez. A correspondent went through five or six miles of the trenches formerly held by the Germans and reconstructed by the French, who now have abandoned them to move forward.

Upward of 100,000 Germans have fallen or been captured in these trenches, according to the French official count, since the second week of March. The French losses, the correspondent was confidentially informed, while serious, have been much smaller than those of the Germans.

WARSAW ATTACK EXPECTED

Germans Believed to Be Abandoning Galician Field to Austrian Armies.

London.—According to dispatches from Petrograd, the principal factor in the defeat of the Austro-German left wing near Krasnik, in southern Russian Poland, and the subsequent quietness in this region is thought by Russian military commentators to be a general shifting of German forces northward to the Warsaw front and the abandonment of the Galician field to the Austrians under General Eduard von Boehm-Ermolli.

Russian official statement reports the blocking of German attempts to advance toward Warsaw from the north and east, and declares the offensive taken by the German armies below Lublin is developing. The Teutonic forces in this southern Poland region are continuing to retreat, Petrograd declares, but are fighting stubbornly as they retire.

Southwest Africa Won by British

Pretoria, South Africa.—The entire German territory known as German Southwest Africa, comprising 322,450 square miles, has been surrendered unconditionally to General Botha, commanding the Union of South Africa forces. This includes all the German military forces in that region.

Archbishop of Chicago Dead

Rochester, N. Y.—James Edward Quigley, Catholic archbishop of Chicago, died here at the home of his brother, Chief of Police Quigley, after a long illness.
