

County Court has A Busy Session

Person for indemnity for three cows slaughtered under Chapter 14 of the General Laws of 1913. Proper affidavits and notices appearing. Court allowed indemnity in the sum of \$75.00. Order warrant drawn in favor of David A. Patterson in the sum of \$37.50. Clerk instructed to forward copy of hearing to State Treasurer.

Order duplicate warrant issued to Paul B. Powers in place of certain lost warrants in the sum of \$276.86 as total amount of said warrants with accumulated interest. Order the following warrants cancelled: Class 26, Nos. 1660 and 1963; Class 27 Nos. 536 and 981

Final hearing in C. E. McDowell Road. No objections, proper notice shown to property owners; Surveyor directed to make final survey and report.

SCHOOL-TEACHERS MAY WED

Marriage Found No Bar to Teaching in Oregon.

Portland, Or.—Marriage is not a cause for which a school board in Oregon may remove a permanent teacher from her position. Judge Morrow so held when, after considering the case more than three months he sustained the position of Maud L. Richards in her case against the school board. Mrs. Richards filed an application for a peremptory writ of mandamus forcing the school board to reinstate her as a teacher and to pay her salary from January 4, 1915, the day she was married to Oren R. Richards and discharged by Superintendent Alderman.

GARRANZA FORCES TAKE MEXICO CITY

Galveston, Texas.—A cablegram received from Vera Cruz gives first particulars of the battle and the occupation of Mexico City by General Pablo Gonzales. Gonzales telegraphed Carranza that the occupation of the city began with heavy fighting between Guadalupe and Rio Consulado, within the city limits. As a result of the fight, he said, Zapatistas lost more than 3500 men in killed and wounded, four cannon and large quantities of arms and ammunition.

Reports say that Gonzales already has rushed several trains of provisions into the city to the relief of thousands of destitute civilians and that the arrival of these trains caused a great demonstration in favor of the constitutionalists.

Officers of all governmental departments are leaving Vera Cruz for Mexico City, where the constitutionalist government will be maintained.
