Superintendent Baughman of the Crook County High School recently mailed a large number of circular letters to persons in some of the adjoining counties, calling attention to the law passed by the last legislature which provides that all pupils living in a county where there is no regular standard high school, may attend in another county and that the tuition must be paid by the county of which said pupil is a resident.

Annual Flower Show at Bend

The annual flower show at Bend last week was an event of unusual importance in the community. This show, which would be called a fair in some communities, was the fifth event of the kind at Bend and this year there were 564 individual entries.

Writing on the subject in his last issue, the editor of the Bend Press says in part:

From the moment the doors opened at 2 o'clock until the hour of 10, the large room was crowded with admirers of the beautiful flowers, and many from outside the city expressed their astonishment at the varied display.

Tho the date was just a little late for roses and a trifle too early for asters, the display of these flowers left no room for excuses, for they were indeed very near perfect.

The greatest interest centered around the contest for the Emblem Club cup, offered for the most artistic display of flowers. This is an annual contest in which one must win for three consecutive years before gaining permanent possession.
