BRIEF WAR NEWS

It is authoritatively asserted that 54 of the German U-boats have been lost.

Austrian troops have forced a crossing of the Sereth river in their offensive movement to sweep the Russians out of Galicia.

The French, Belgian and British artillery continues an insistent bombardment of the German trenches and cantonments in the west.

Several men from a British submarine succeeded in blowing up a span of the important Gebz railway bridge, only 26 miles southeast of Constantinople.

Aviator Adolph Pegoud was killed in action. He fell 6000 feet. Pegoud was the first aviator in the world to "loop the loop" in an aeroplane and was regarded as the greatest aviator of France.

Fifteen hundred and fifty men, 1250 of whom were British soldiers and the others members of the crew, were lost on a British transport which has been sunk by a mine off the entrance to the Dardanelles.

Continuing pursuit of the Russians is continuing in the Bielovjesh forest region and the marshes east of Brest-Litovsk. Field Marshal von Mackensen's forces have worked to within less than 40 miles of Pinsk.

Grodno, the last fortress to hold out in the Russian second line of defense, has been captured by the Germans under Field Marshal von Hindenburg after a terrific battle that was continued through the streets of the city, which has a population of 40,000.

Cardinal Gibbons discussed peace with President Wilson at the White House. The cardinal declined to give out any details, but admitted he had received a message from the pope and following his interview with the president, said the object of his visit was the discussion of peace.

SHORT NEWS NUGGETS

President Wilson is expected to take up Secretary Garrison's plans for re-organization of the army immediately.

The army camp wiped out in Texas City by the recent flood will not be reestablished. Secretary of War Garrison has announced.

The Cobb county, Georgia, grand jury reported that it had been unable to find enough evidence, after a two days' examination of witnesses, to indict any one for the lynching of Leo M. Frank.

Under the direction of Charles M. Schwab, president of the Bethlehem Steel corporation, American war plants are to put the government of China on a basis of military and naval preparedness.

Governor Johnson of California has issued a proclamation lifting the quarantine against cattle being shipped into California from many states. The quarantine was laid when the foot-and-mouth disease raged.

Substantial reduction in the west-bound transcontinental freight rates will become effective October 18 under the new tariffs filed with the interstate commerce commission by all the carriers comprising the transcontinental freight bureau, which includes all the lines terminating in the northwest.

Snow Halts War in Alps.

Rome.—A heavy fall of snow, coming several weeks before the usual beginning of the Alpine winter, has nearly called a halt on military operations along the Trentino frontier, General Cadorna reported.

State Forester F. A. Elliott has prepared a map of Oregon and has furnished to State Superintendent Churchill enough copies to supply each school district in Oregon. The map is four by six feet, giving the sectional lines, showing all the physical features of Oregon and the location of all cities and towns.

BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

There is an automobile for every 26.8 persons living in Oregon.

The first annual livestock show of Hood River county opened Friday.

A telephone line has just been completed from Medford to Crater Lake.

The Grand Army of the Republic encampment of southern Oregon met in Medford.

The Wasco county fair will be held in The Dalles September 28, 29, 30 and October 1.

The sixth annual "Punkin" show of northern Lane county was held in Junction City.

The annual state fair automobile show will be held at Salem, September 27-October 2, inclusive.

Flax acreage next season will be limited by the state board of control to 500 acres, it was decided.

Polk county crops of grain, hay, hops and fruit are declared satisfactory in all parts of the county.

The Ohio Society of Oregon was organized at an enthusiastic meeting of 100 ex-residents of Ohio in Portland.

Over 100,000 young trout have been planted in the Rickreall river by the Nesmith Rod and Gun Club, of Dallas. The Sisters fair association will on October 14, 15 and 16, hold its second annual fair and race meet in that city.

The forest service is packing lumber for the building of a permanent ranger's cabin on the summit of Mt. Hood.

Tentative plans for the floating of a \$15,000 bond issue were made at a meeting of the Y. M. C. A. board of directors at Baker.

Of 176 accidents during the week ending September 17, three were fatal, was reported to the state industrial accident insurance commission.

Bids are being received by the engineers for the Port of Astoria commission for the erection of a large grain elevator on the Astoria waterfront.

Attempting to jump from a buggy while the horses were running away, Mrs. J. L. Masters plunged head first to the pavement in Baker and was killed.

The right-of-way committee for the Sutherland, Coos Bay & Eastern railroad has announced that grading on the road would begin within the next few days.

The highly improved 451-acre farm of F. A. Lundquist, situated near Dundee, in Yamhill county, has been sold to C. W. Aultman for a reported consideration of \$85,000.

The quarantine on dogs that has been in effect in Polk and Yamhill counties for the past two months has been ordered lifted by the state livestock sanitary board.

At a recent election the voters of Echo voted in favor of the erection of a new city hall that will cost about \$10,000 and voted an additional \$3000 to be spent in improving parks.

An eastern Oregon fair, to comprise all counties east of the Cascades, is being advocated by Baker boosters as the result of the success of the co-operative plan of the Baker county fair this year.
