CROOK COUNTY OWES TOWNS AND SCHOOLS

Bend and Madras Will Get Largest Amounts

PRINEVILLE SCHOOL \$1108.43

Expert Max Crandall Submits Final Report After Months Checking Up Records

Crook County owes more than \$11,000 to the various towns and school districts in Crook and Jefferson counties according to a report just completed by Max Crandall, on moneys that have been collected from delinquent taxes, and the interest upon said collections, ranging over a period of several years.

Of this amount the city of Princville gets but \$151, while school district number 1 which is located in Princville will receive \$1108.43.

The city of Bend will receive \$837 and the Bend school district \$2,472 more, the city of Redmond has \$767 coming to it and Madras will be paid \$2,092 by this county in squaring the bill.

While many of the districts were unpaid, some received more than they were entitled to. The total of the overpayments amounted to \$1,180.77 which amount is now due the county from the various districts while the total amount the county will be compelled to pay is

Mr. Crandall has been working on the county records practically all the time since June 1, and has had for negotiations. one man assisting during that time. He has handled a total of about 4000 items in making out his report,

which is a fair sized volume in itself.
